When the combined Doherty and Sheen fingers fell upon Don Trainor as a main eventer they could hardly have made a better choice. Don is a popular fighter and a good one. He is young, strong, fast and in his last appearance at the local Forum showed vicious punching power in shelling Bill Crawford to the canvas in 1.58 of the first round. Crawford was no push-over. He had a good record and, although he was considerably shorter in stature than the Charlottetown boy, he was obviously in great shape.

Trainer's adversary in the main go is a newcomer to Maritime rings but certainly no newcomer to the fight game. Earl MacDonald was good enough to cop the Western Canadian welterweight title before heading east looking for more land to conquer and brought with him a record of 22 wins in 26 bouts, with 2 defeats and 2 ties. One of his setbacks was a knockout at the hands of a hard-hitting lad by the name of Hoxey from Seattle. Hoxey apparently is a power hitter having sent 24 of 29 opponents to an early sleep.

MacDonald's manager is well known to Island fans having handled Ace McCluskey some years ago. He is Gussie MacLellan, who now has MacDonald fighting out of Glace Bay. Don Trainor in the meantime has been in training at Dartmouth under the experienced guiding hand of Tom McCluskey and has for his sparring mate Ace and Cobey.

In the semi-final go Bud Ramsey, a former Summerside boy, will match savy with Holly Borden. This will be a return match for the two gladiators and if it is even half as good as their first bout at Halifax could easily steal the show.

May Substitute Shorter Swim

TORONTO (CP)—If bad weather causes cancellation of next Tuesday's Canadian National Exhibition mass swim across Lake Ontario, a swim along the Toronto lakefront will be substituted, exhibition officials said Wednesday.

Harry Price, chairman of the CNE sports committee, said Wednesday the substitute swim will be between 21 and 28 miles, compared with the 32-mile route across the lake.

The decision on whether to hold the across-the-lake swim or the substitute race will be made at 8 p.m. Monday.

He said it also is possible officials may postpone the across-the-lake swim for 24 hours and make the same decision at 8 p.m. Tuesday. The choice will depend on wind and wave conditions and weather forecasts, he said.

Doctors said 35 entrants—nine women and 26 men—all passed medical tests Wednesday and were found fit to make the attempt. Four men entered but did not show up but examinations would be made to examine them later.

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Horsemen Lack Confidence In Ont. Stewards

TORONTO (CP)—The executive of the Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association Tuesday night voted unanimously to submit a brief to the Ontario racing commission expressing lack of confidence in the stewards who officiate on Ontario race tracks. Officials said the brief will cite lack of experience and lack of ability as reasons for the stand. It was reported the brief will urge replacement of the present stewards.

A similar brief will be sent from the Jockey's Guild, one report said. During the final week of the Fort Erie meeting jockeys threatened to strike in protest against a ruling of the stewards.

PORT ARTHUR, Ont. (CP)—Police said Wednesday they are checking a report that a bullet creased the forehead of centre fielder Eddie Cox during a baseball play-off game Tuesday night at the Port Arthur Stadium.

Cox was in the act of catching a fly ball when he felt a burning sensation across the side of his forehead. He went to the dug-out and the game was temporarily held up. No announcement was made and fans did not know what caused the brief hold-up. Cox went back into the game.

Police said they were not sure the injury was caused by a bullet.

OSHAWA, Ont. (CP)—Nicholas Stonecky, 60, of nearby Pickering Tuesday was fined \$100 and costs or one month in jail on a charge of illegally operating a still. Police said the still could produce 150 proof alcohol. "That could knock your hat off," commented Magistrate F. S. Ebbs.
