

# Rough Riders Snap Losing Run In 20-9 Win Over AIs

Ottawa Rough Riders snapped a losing run of four games with a 20-9 victory Saturday over Montreal Alouettes in a Big Four football game in Ottawa.

**CROWD GOES WILD**

Meanwhile, Sam Etcheverry completed 20 out of 36 pass attempts for a total of 296 Montreal yards. His two best targets were Joey Pal, who took a touchdown pass in the first quarter, and Hal Patterson.

# Sunday Baseball Broadcasts Sharply Criticized By Church

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP) — A United Church of Canada minister Saturday sharply criticized Sunday baseball broadcasts which keep church services off the air.

Rev. Dr. J. R. Mutchmor, secretary of the board of evangelism, said the New York Yankees baseball team, which he called the American League entry in the world series, will almost certainly end up playing at least one series game on a Sunday.

"That game will be broadcast and that means The Church of the Air will not be broadcast. For this one Sunday in 52 the church will be superseded by the New York Yankees."

"You shall have only one God, the Bible says. You can't have it both ways."

"The Church of the Air is a religious program carried by many American and Canadian radio stations."

**ON MODERN LIFE**  
Dr. Mutchmor's remarks introduced to the Church's General Council several resolutions criticizing modern life.

They called for less materialism and a tighter home life to revive a Christian feeling to counter "a general spirit of secularization."

# San Francisco Wins National Amateur Ch'ships

LAKE OREST, Ill. (AP) — The U. S. Golf Association, Friday awarded the 1958 national amateur championship and the fourth international match for the Americas Cup to the Olympic Country club, San Francisco, and set the dates for the 1957 national open at Tulsa, Okla.

The Amateur will be played Sept. 8-13 at the Olympic Club. The Americas Cup match against amateur teams representing Canada and Mexico will be played Sept. 5-8.

# Steel Output In The U. S. On Increase

CLEVELAND (AP) — Capacity of steel ingot production in the United States is expected to reach 132,000,000 tons a year by next Jan. 1, Steel Magazine says.

Expenditures for new equipment and construction in the steel industry, expected to total \$1,200,000,000 this year, already have pushed ingot capacity 1,000,000 tons above that of last Jan. 1 when it stood at 128,363,000 net tons.

The magazine says expansion programs under way at steel manufacturers total 14,300,700 net tons of production, with completion dates extending into 1959.

"More projects are being planned and would be announced promptly if the government would again permit fast tax amortization of steelmaking facilities," the publication says.

Steel expansion matches general capital spending for new year, it adds. The light money facilities which is expected to reach \$35,000,000,000 this year as compared with \$28,700,000,000 last year affect general plans, at facilities aren't expected to materialize in the short run.

# Worry Causes Silver-Haired Soccer Manager To Bow Out

LONDON (CP) — Silver-haired Jimmy Seed is bowing out of British soccer. At 61, he finds football worry is killing him.

"I couldn't sleep at nights," says Seed, whose resignation as manager of first-division Charlton Athletic came two days after the club had suffered a humiliating 8-1 defeat by Sunderland. That added irony to the situation, since it was Sunderland that fired Seed as a player, after one bad match, some 37 years ago.

Seed, a bulky man with a ready smile, had managed Charlton for nearly a quarter of a century. He took over a debt-ridden team in the third division, drove it into the first division in two seasons, starting in 1934 and wiped out the debts.

But this year, with the 1956-57 season still only a few weeks old, Charlton Athletic fell upon evil days. When Seed quit, the team had lost its first five games, scoring only four goals compared with 19 for their opponents.

**THROUGH WITH SOCCER**  
At first, Seed promised that Charlton would fight back. He indicated that he would remain in the saddle. But the club announced his retirement and later, at his home in Bromley, Kent,

# Coarse Fish Are Cleaned Out By Old S. A. Indian Poison

VANCOUVER (CP) — The British Columbia game commission in its program of clearing lakes of "coarse" fish is using a chemical first used by primitive Indians in South America.

It is called rotenone, derived from derrick root, a plant first discovered by white men when Indians were seen using it to stun fish for food.

The latest lake to be cleaned with rotenone is Deer Lake in suburban Burnaby and it will be restocked with Kamloops trout.

**HARMLESS TO HUMANS**  
Rotenone is poisonous to fish and insects but harmless to warm-blooded animals, including humans. Stuart Smith, game commission biologist, proved this before the clearing operation at Deer Lake by drinking a glass of rotenone solution, which he said tasted "horrible."

But the chemical may soon be replaced by a newer one, toxaphene, now being used experimentally. Toxaphene has similar properties to rotenone but is considerably cheaper. Officials say that whereas it would cost \$32,000 to treat a lake one mile square and 20 feet deep with rotenone, the job could be done with toxaphene for \$900. 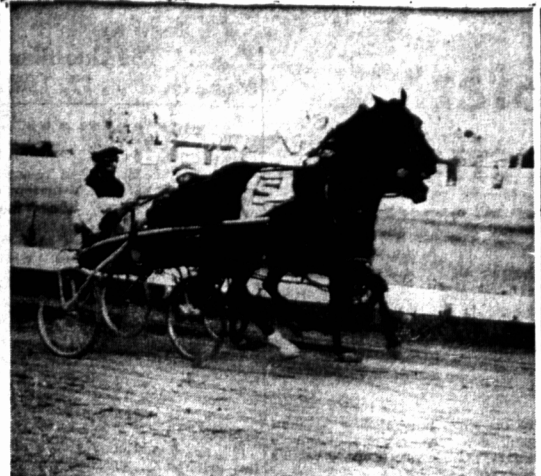
