Premier Shaw to Officiate  
Glittering New Regional School To Open At Miscouche Monday

SUMMERSIDE — Miscouche Rural Regional High School, a gleaming new two-story brick and concrete building, will be officially opened Monday afternoon at 3 p.m. by Premier Walter R. Shaw, following the laying of the cornerstone by Education Minister L.G. Dewar.

This modern new school, a part of the Miscouche-Summerville high school, regional school unit, will provide accommodation for up to 200 students, grades nine to 12, from Miscouche and the seven districts of St. Nicholas, Union Corner, South-West Lot 16, Wellington Centre, Richmond, Grand River, and Bayvide.

Following the official opening a reception will be held in the school, and in the evening the Miscouche band will present a hand concert in the auditorium. An orchestra will provide dance music for guests and residents of those districts who have children attending the school.

The new school, 186 feet in overall length, contains seven classrooms, laboratory, library, home economics room, and auditorium.

Ben W. DesRoche of Miscouche is chairman of the committee in charge of purchasing supplies and looking after arrangements in connection with the construction of the school and the official opening.

Mr. DesRoche is representing this area on the overall board of trustees of the three-unit regional high school. The principal of this new school is Sister St. Mary Gagnier, and vice-principal is John DesRoche.

With the expected increase in enrollment next year, the present teaching staff is expected to be increased from seven to eight.

The contract for the school was awarded to the R.B. Rankin Construction Co. of Summerside and the construction which started with the sod turning ceremony was commenced on July 15.

MOVING DAY  
Saturday, May 11, 1963, was moving day for the students who are occupying the new building and the first classes were held in the new facilities on Monday, May 13.

The laboratory in the school is equipped for the teaching and study of physics, chemistry and biology, and contains 14 separate double tables with a demonstration centre table.

The auditorium, gymnasium, 58 x 62, is designed for basketball, table tennis, volleyball and badminton, and is equipped with dressing rooms and showers, and a large stage at one end of the auditorium which will serve both the school and the community.

The entire building is hooked up with a public address system controlled from the office of the principal, and time clocks and automatic belts are also located in each of the classrooms.

The grounds of the new school have been landscaped and present a neat attractive appearance, and a 10 acre field at the rear of the school provides football and soccer, and an area sufficient for any of the outdoor scholastic sports. The physical instructor of the school is Clarence Gallant.

Cornerstone Laying Set  
SUMMERSIDE — The program for the official opening of the Miscouche Regional High School at 3 p.m. on Monday, was announced yesterday by the chairman, Ben W. DesRoche.

The first item on the program will be a chorus of school children who will sing "O Canada" and this will be followed by an address of welcome by the chairman, Mr. DesRoche.

Hon. L.G. Dewar, province 11 minutes of education, will be introduced by Hon. Henry Wedge, minister of welfare, and after that will participate in the laying of the cornerstone.

Hon. Walter R. Shaw, Premier, will be introduced by the Hon. Hubert MacNeill, minister of health, and will cut the ribbon and declare the school officially open, after making an address to the students, guests, and all other interested persons assembled for the occasion.

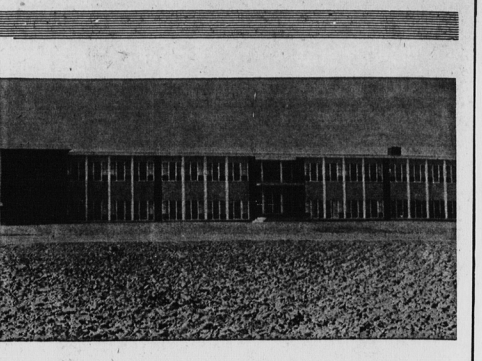

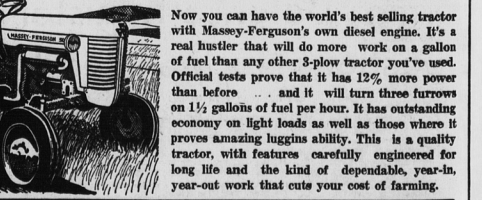
