

Giants Wallop Pirates 21-4; Braves Win Eight Straight

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Giants scored 11 runs in the eighth inning—the biggest single inning in the majors this season—and walloped Pittsburgh Pirates 21-4 Tuesday night for their fourth straight victory.

The New York run total was the second highest of the season, only two shy of the Chicago Cubs' 23 against St. Louis during the first week of play.

Whitey Lockman led the 22-hit assault with three singles and the first grand-slam home run of his major league career.

Pitcher Johnny Antonelli hit his first major league homer with a man aboard during the 11-run eighth. Davey Williams also homered in the big inning. Ray Katt slammed a triple and a double. Bill Gardner and Don Mueller added doubles and Willie Mays a triple.

The victory was Antonelli's sixth against two losses. The defeat was charged against young Bob Purkey who left for a pinch-hitter in the fifth when the score was still a mild 4-1 against him. Joe Page and Johnny Hetki absorbed the eight-inning punishment.

CINCINNATI (AP)—Milwaukee Braves chalked up their eighth straight victory Tuesday night, downing Cincinnati Redlegs 3-1 behind the six-hit pitching of Warren Spahn, who homered in an insurance run.

Hank Aaron smashed a home run in the same inning with Joe Adcock aboard to give the Braves a full game lead in the National League.

Spahn struck out three and walked three in gaining his fifth win in eight decisions.

Ted Kluszewski cracked his 11th home run of the year in the second inning.

Righthander Herm Wehmeier retired the first 11 men he faced and the Braves collected only five hits off him and a single off relief man Frank Smith. It was the second straight loss for Wehmeier.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Catcher Sam White hit a bases-empty ninth-inning homer to give Boston Red Sox a 3-2 win over Philadelphia Athletics Tuesday night.

Sportsman Is Rescued After 4 Days In Woods

WINNIPEG (CP) — A Winnipeg sportsman who was rescued from the wilderness of eastern Manitoba after being lost for nearly four days was flown to Winnipeg late Tuesday for hospital treatment.

Hospital officials described his condition as "not very good."

William Mandock, 42, had wandered through the rugged wilderness forest reserve since Saturday morning when he missed a rendezvous with a week-end fishing party at Horseshoe Lake, 75 miles north-east of Winnipeg.

He was found at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday by his cousin, Roy Melnychenko of Winnipeg, one of 31 men who joined the RCMP in the search. His legs and arms were bruised and swollen. He had lost his shoes and was covered with bruises from stumbling through the bush.

Shivering and dazed, he was sitting on the ground when Mr. Melnychenko found him. He was suffering from exposure and spoke incoherently. Searchers said he seemed to ignore an RCMP plane which swept low over him Monday.

Mr. Mandock said he dodged numerous bears and survived on four swamp water. Near exhaustion, he said he thought he heard voices and saw a mirage.
