OTTAWA, April 18.—Hon. Alex. McKenzie died yesterday morning, at 1.24 o'clock. The absence of Premier Abbott, to Montreal, prevents the conclusion of any arrangements for formal participation in obsequies. The ministers here favor a public funeral.

Murray River Notes.

A rousing temperance meeting was held on the evening of the 13th inst., in the Good Templars' Hall, at Murray River, under the auspices of Dawn of Day Lodge, No. 13, I. O. G. T. Stirring speeches were delivered by Rev. A. Freeman and Rev. Silas James, each closing with an earnest appeal to voters, temperance workers, old and young, to do all in their power to prevent a repeal of Canada Temperance Act in this county. Short speeches were also delivered by various members of Dawn of Day Lodge. A choir, composed of members of the Lodge, aided by some from Prince Albert and Star of Hope, supplied the meeting with temperance music, Miss Laura Roberts, of P. A. Lodge presiding at the organ with all her usual skill. The house was well filled and best of order prevailed until the meeting closed at a late hour by all singing "God be with you till we meet again."—Com.

North Atlantic Steamship Co.

A company under the above title was formed in Boston on Monday last, when the terms of agreement were signed. The following gentlemen constitute the company: Frank G. Webster, Alfred Winsor, Robert Winsor, and William Endicott. Mr. Webster is a partner in the banking house of Kidder, Peabody & Co. Mr. Alfred Winsor is president of the Boston & Philadelphia Steamship company, and of the Boston Towboat Co. Messrs Robert Winsor and William Endicott, 3d, are connected with the house of Kidder, Peabody & Co.
Mr. Alfred Winsor is president of the new company, and the Capital stock is \$500,000. The company is formed to do a freighting and passenger business between ports in New England and ports in the Canadian provinces, and will begin business the present spring—that is as soon as arrangements for carrying it on can be perfected.—Boston Herald.

Hope for a Settlement.

OTTAWA, April 17.—The government have not yet lost all hope of reaching an amicable settlement with Newfoundland. The offer of the modus vivendi, made through Lord Knutsford having been pigeon-holed by the officials of the colonial office, the Dominion government yesterday made a direct offer by cable to Newfoundland for an interim arrangement on the lines of that suggested to Knutsford. Both countries to revert to the status quo of 1869 pending a conference between representatives of the two governments. Meanwhile, according to advices received by the government yesterday, public feeling in Newfoundland appears to be settling strongly against the Whiteway government. A message sent to the minister of marine and fisheries reads, "All shire towns, and the principal centres in seven electoral districts, including Sir William Whiteway's and Mr. Bond's, protest against the tariff on Canadian goods. Petitions are being numerously signed."

St. Paul's Church Easter Meeting.

The annual meeting of the St. Paul's congregation was held in the Schoolroom last evening at 8 o'clock. The Rector occupied the chair and opened the meeting with prayer and a few introductory remarks, after which the Reports and accounts for the past year were presented by the people's Church-warden, Mr. H. J. Cundall. Their adoption was moved by Judge Hensley, seconded by the Hon. D. Davies, supported by Mr. Chas. Palmer and unanimously passed. Mr. Fitzgerald moved that an effort be made to increase the voluntary subscriptions given by means of envelope contributions. Mr. H. J. Cundall seconded. Passed. Moved by Judge Hensley, seconded by Mr. H. J. Cundall that the Pew Rents and assessments be continued at the same rate as the preceding year. Mr. R. R. Fitzgerald and Mr. R. do Bois were thanked by the Rector for the assistance given by them in reading the lessons on Sundays. The following gentlemen were appointed as members of the Vestry for the ensuing year: Messrs. F. L. Hazard, R. R. Fitzgerald, H. J. Cundall, W. H. Aitken, Geo. Peake, A. B. Warburton, S. Grey, Geo. J. Wright. The following were appointed as representatives to the Diocesan Synod: Mr. H. J. Cundall and Mr. F. L. Hazard. Substitutes Mr. R. R. Fitzgerald and Mr. Chas. Palmer. Mr. Sidney Grey moved a vote of thanks to the choir and all who have assisted them in the musical portion of the services of the church. The thanks of the meeting were accorded to the Rector for having secured the services of the Rev. F. H. Du Vernet to conduct the Mission recently held in St. Paul's Church. The meeting terminated with benediction.
