THIRD CLASS.  
Examination August 17, 1881.

English—Parsing and Analysis of pas-  
sages from the 6th Royal Reader, pages  
154-175. Currier's Grammar. Reading  
An abstract of a narrative.  
History—Outlines of English History.  
Geography—Geography of the Dominion.  
Outlines of general geography.  
Arithmetic—Smith's smaller Arithmetic  
throughout. Smith's Advanced Arithme-  
tic to the end of Decimal fractions.  
French (optional)—same as for second  
class.

SECOND CLASS.  
Examination, June, 1882.

English—Paradise Lost, Book II. (1-505).  
British History—From the beginning of

Natural Philosophy—Simpson's Natural  
Philosophy, first and third divisions.  
Latin—Grammar: Cicero, Third Oration  
against Cataline; Virgil's Aeneid, Book I.  
(1-405) Arnold's Prose Composition to  
Exercise 44.  
Algebra—Colenso to the end of quad-  
ratics.  
Greek—Bryce's First Greek Reader,  
part I; Xenophon's Anabasis, Book IV.  
French—Grammar: Hall's Second  
Course to page 78; Le Misanthrope, (Mo-  
liere).  
Trigonometry and Practical Geometry.—  
Hann's Trigonometry, chapters 1, 2 and 3;  
Chamber's Practical Mathematics, solution  
of plain triangles, heights and distances.  
School Management—Morrison's.  
Music.  
Note—Ladies may omit Greek, Trigon-  
ometry and Practical Geometry.

FIRST CLASS HONORS (Academic Class.)

The examination for this class will be  
open to all first class Teachers of two years'  
experience, who have obtained first rank in  
professional work.

Latin—Arnold's Prose Composition, Part  
I. Horace, Odes, Book I. Livy, Books  
xxi, chaps. 1-37.

Greek—Arnold's Prose Composition.  
Homer, Iliad, Book I. Herodotus, Book I,  
chaps. 1-42.

French—Moliere, Le Bourgeois gentil-  
homme. Racine, Iphigenie. French Com-  
position.

Mathematics—Algebra, Colenso's Stu-  
dents Algebra (throughout).  
Geometry—Euclid (with exercise), solid  
Geometry, and Geometrical conic sections.  
Trigonometry—Plane and Spherical Trig-  
onometry, with practical examples from  
Chamber's Mathematics.

English and English History—The History  
and Literature of the 19th century.  
An acquaintance with the principal works  
of the period required. English language  
(Angus)

Candidates in order to obtain the grade  
of license sought, must make 50 per cent  
of the whole number of marks obtainable;  
50 per cent in English, 50 per cent in  
arithmetic; and also not less than 20 per  
cent, in each of the other subjects.

The examination for third class licenses  
will be held in August of each  
year. Candidates for this grade of license  
must, after passing the non-professional  
examination prescribed by the Board of  
Education, attend one term in the Training  
Department of the Prince of Wales College  
for professional instruction, and pass a  
satisfactory examination therein, after  
which they shall receive third class licenses.

The examination for second and first-class  
licenses will be held in June of each year.  
No one will be allowed to take this ex-  
amination who has not attended a term at the  
College and Normal School, unless he had  
previously obtained a license for the third  
class under the Public Schools Act, 1877.

## Not Bad.

Mr. Blake is dining at the hotel  
dinner table with Mr. Elder and a  
few other friends. Mr. Elder invites a  
Liberal-Conservative gentleman present  
to refresh himself. The gentleman re-  
sponds favorably. Thereupon, a pleasant  
bystander jokingly tells the Conservative  
imbric that he is drinking to the  
health of Her Majesty's loyal Opposition;  
and the quick and witty reply is "yes,  
indeed, and long may they enjoy their  
present seats!" An account of the affair,  
by some means, gets into the St. John  
Sun, and the editor of the Telegraph  
laments another "social outrage."

In a recent work on the sign language  
of the North American Indians, Colonel  
Mallery argues against the theory that  
the tribes speaking mutually unintelligible  
dialects or languages have a common  
system of signs. He believes that the  
signs remarked on by ethnologists are  
used to enforce rather than to convey  
meaning. Indians who are employed as  
guides or interpreters have much use for  
signs, their frequent employment of which  
has led white observers to infer the ex-  
istence of a common sign language. Col.  
Mallery is of the opinion that the Indian  
in general know comparatively few of the  
more abstruse signs, though facility of ex-  
pression by signs is common to all In-  
dians, being due to the limited number of  
each tribe and the fact that the wander-  
ing habits of all often bring the individ-  
uals comprising each into contact with  
others with whom they can communicate  
only by signs.

SUGAR—The New York Herald says  
the action of the United States sugar  
men in agreeing to restrict production in  
order to keep up the price is in the line  
of the policy so successfully adopted by  
the coal mining companies, and remarks  
that the more quickly this principle shall  
spread among firms and corporations  
controlling the necessities of life the  
sooner will the mass of the people awake  
to the importance of settling the practical  
ethics involved in manipulating for the  
benefit of a few gifts the Creator meant  
for all.

THE GREAT LAND SLIDE IN SWITZER-  
LAND.—A Geneva despatch says:—The  
great land slip near Sigriswil reported  
on the 29th ult., is steadily moving  
towards the Lake of Thun at the rate of  
three metres a day. It is three miles  
long and a mile broad. The depth is  
unknown. A house in its path has been  
deserted. Sigriswil and the neighbour-  
ing villages are out of danger.

occurrence. One compositor put into the  
mouth of one of Mr. Gladstone's admirers  
the statement that the right honorable  
gentleman was the "spout" of the Liberal  
party—an epithet especially unhappy in  
view of the fact that the word really used  
was "spirit," which means quite a differ-  
ent thing. Another made the extraordi-  
nary and obscure statement that the Chris-  
tian religion enjoins mahogany, when  
"monogamy" was clearly meant.
