Red Cross Obtains 93 Per Cent Of Objective

Returns amounting to \$25,000, or 93 per cent of the objective were reported to date for the 1962 Red Cross appeal by W.R. Jenkins, provincial campaign chairman at yesterday's meeting of the P.E.I. Red Cross executive chaired by the president, Mrs. H.L. Palmer. Mr. Jenkins said that there are still some 10 districts throughout the province to report, and that he is confident the results will be considerably in excess of the objective when all returns are received.

Robert Tomber, chairman of disaster services, expressed thanks to volunteer members of the Red Cross who were called upon to render emergency assistance to families who recently lost their homes as the result of fires.

Mrs. L.E. Prowse, the newly appointed chairman of volunteers, described a program of friendly visiting which she is presently serving for veterans and others in the various hospitals. She said that the complete register is being set up of volunteers engaged in Red Cross services throughout the province.

The gratifying response at the Red Cross fund-raising blood donor clinics was commended by the provincial chairman of this campaign, P.A.S. Jones, who paid tribute to the chairman and committee members who arranged the clinics. He said that for this year at Charlottetown, Summerside, Brackley Point Road, the magistrate reduced the charge to that of driving while impaired and fined the accused \$125 and costs or 30 days. Skating Champs Go To Japan

MILAN, Italy (AP)—The International Skating Union Wednesday set the dates and sites for the world speed skating and figure skating championships in 1963 and outlined the probable schedule for the 1964 title tournament.

Both the men's and women's 1963 speed skating championships will be held at Karuizawa, Japan, Feb. 21-24. The 1963 figure skating meet for men and women will be held at Cortina d'Ampezzo, Italy, Feb. 27-March 3.

The 1964 men's speed skating meet will be held in Finland, Feb. 21-25 and the women's meet in Sweden, Feb. 14-15.

The 1964 world figure skating tournament will be held in either East or West Germany, Feb. 25-30.
