**LOCATION OF THE BRIDGE—
A PLEA FOR DELAY.**

The preeminent advantage of having the proposed bridge across the Hillsborough located between Charlottetown and Southport need not again be stated or enlarged upon.

We greatly regret to learn, notwithstanding the reasonable representations of THE EXAMINER, several times repeated, without a survey of the alternative location, and without an estimate of the difference of cost, that it has "practically been agreed" that the bridge shall extend "from Mutch's Point on the Southport side to Kensington range on this side."

This decision is against—
1. The interests of the people of the Province, at large, whose heavy expenditure upon the bridge is to be, as far as possible, recouped by means of tolls.

2. The interests of Charlottetown, in particular, as being inconvenient and therefore tending to draw trade and traffic out of the present limits of the city rather than into the city.

3. The interest of Southport and all who live or who may hereafter live in the section of the country westward of the proposed line of railway.

Moreover, the bridge, if placed between Mutch's Point and Kensington will not be one whit more advantageous to the people of Fort Augustus, or any other district of country south of the Hillsborough, than it at the head of the railway wharf, as proposed.

From every public point of view the importance of having the bridge between Charlottetown and Southport is evident.

We, therefore, appeal to the authorities to pause before their decision is irrevocable, in order that a survey and estimate of the cost of a bridge between Charlottetown and Southport may be made by a competent engineer.

A few thousand dollars difference in the cost of construction ought not to influence the Government of Canada in regard to a question affecting the public convenience for all time to come.

THE DREYFUS SCANDAL.

The condemnation of Captain Dreyfus will satisfy the chiefs of the French army and the anti-Semitic party in France. But for a large proportion of the people of France—the justice-loving portion—and for the world at large its significance is ominous. The Court of Cassation, after a full and careful investigation, decided that Dreyfus had been unjustly convicted. The unfortunate officer was, thereupon brought out of his infernal prison and subjected to a new trial. At this trial nothing new was brought out, and all the facts going to show that he was innocent—the confession and suicide of Col. Henry, the confession of the scoundrel Esterhazy, as well as other points—were re-established. Yet Dreyfus who all the while protests his innocence has again been convicted and sentenced to ten years imprisonment, while Esterhazy, the self-confessed traitor, goes free.

This is justice as administered by French army officials; and the Republic of France is in the hands of these men.

France is evidently in a bad way, and the future full of danger to republican institutions.

IN THE STATES.

HENRY Clews reports that prosperous conditions continue throughout the land, and the wave advances rather than recedes with bright prospects ahead. A large number of working men are employed today on terms satisfactory to themselves and their employers than ever before in the national history. Discontent is nowhere justifiably to be found. It is true grievances creep out occasionally here and there, but they are not of serious consequence. The demand has fairly caught up to the supply in everything. There is little selling ahead. The business of the country is on a legitimate basis and devoid of boom, which is the best evidence of its substantial and lasting character. Now that the crops are assured and the money scare has passed over, the impetus to push business ahead can be relied upon for the balance of this year at least, thereby making it the best record year ever experienced in business circles.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

—Speaking a few days ago in behalf of the majority in the plebiscite, scandalously hoaxed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues—Mr. J. T. Bulmer, of Halifax said:—"They have run their fist of defiance in the face of every man of the 287,487 who voted for prohibition. Shall we accept their challenge? I say, yes. I helped them in—spent five weeks working for them, and if they had acted right would have spent ten to keep them in. The government is like a had shanty built of rotten pieces of wood, badly held together and unable to suffer any contact with logic and common sense." * * * * * If we can defeat them it will be a lesson to their successors which they will not be slow to ignore." Mr. Bulmer certainly worked hard for the party. He was humbugged by the prohibition plebiscite, and by the promises of economy and cleanness, which have not been kept.

"TOO PREVIOUS".

I went to the Post Office at ten minutes past eight thinking of course that I was in lots of time. I then asked the clerk in the office what time the mail was supposed to close and he told me a quarter past eight. It was then just ten minutes past eight, and the mail courier was taking the bags out of the office to the train; and the train goes at a quarter to nine.

Montreal Gazette: A series of Conservative meetings is being arranged for in Ontario. The good political seed is to be sown, and it will grow, whether the harvest comes early or late. There may not be a general parliamentary election ordered on Mr. Tarte's return from Paris; but if there is the Opposition will not be caught unawares.

Mail and Empire: The vindication of the National Policy is continued day by day. Out of the mouths of its enemies it is receiving praise unstinted. We now find that it is doing excellent work in St. Catharines as elsewhere. There the cotton and paper industries are reported to be booming. The bicycle industry and the wheel industry have augmented their output, and the rubber factory at Port Dalhousie will be a great boon to the city, employing several hundreds of hands.
