The matches fired at the Squaw Point Range yesterday included the MacDonald Tobacco Company match at 200, 500 and 600 yards for the Artillery Trophy. This was won by Lieut. T. F. Baines, R.C.N. (R), with Gunner Strong second place and Sgt. G. A. Coles third.

The Physical Fitness Match at 300 yards was captured by Lieut. R. E. Jenkins in a shoot-off as he and four others tied for top spot with 74's for the 15 rounds. Others in the shoot-off were Lieut. Mary MacLennan, Pte. R. McKay, Sgt. G. G. MacLennan and Capt. R. A. McCabe.

In the P.E.I. Rifle Association Team Match the 'A' team of the P.E.I. Regiment led the field with a score of 1,010. Members of the team were Major G. A. MacDonal, Capt. A. J. McCabe and Capt. R. A. 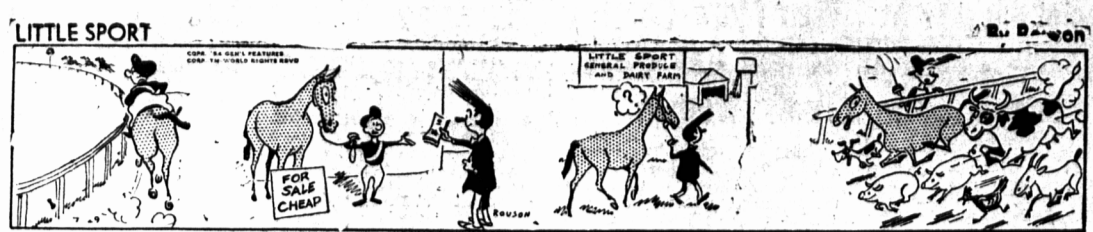

Yankees Rally In Ninth To Defeat White Sox 7-5

Two City League softball games are scheduled to be played this evening at 6:45. The Basilica Youth Club will meet the Parkdale Lions on the Parkdale diamond while the Bike Shop Wheelers play Keele Drug on the old diamond.

(By The Canadian Press) The New York Yankees scored six runs in the last two innings, three of them on a ninth inning homer by Mickey Mantle, and the Chicago White Sox 7-5 Wednesday.

The victory moved the Yankees within two games of the league leading Cleveland Indians who had a night engagement with Boston. Mantle's blast into the centre field seats came after the game had been held up 68 minutes by rain with the Yanks at bat in the top of the ninth. Irv Noren led off the ninth with a walk against Jack Harshman and took third on a single by Joe Collins. Then came Mantle.

The New York Giants broke a six-game losing streak with a 10-0 uprisng against the St. Louis Cardinals. Johnny Antonelli pitched the shutout, his fifth of the season and his 15th triumph, tying him with Robin Roberts for the most victories in the league.

Dusty Rhodes hit three home runs and Willie Mays slammed his 36th. Eddie Mathews of Milwaukee led the league last season with 43.

In the only other daylight action the Detroit Tigers walloped Philadelphia 10-2 as Steve Souchock came off the bench to hit a pair of three-run homers. The veteran outfielder has been sidelined most of the season with a broken left wrist. Al Aber pitched his first complete game and levelled his record at 4-4.

BALTIMORE (AP) - Joe Coleman, Wednesday night pitched Baltimore Orioles their second straight victory over Washington Senators, a three-hit 2-1 triumph in a pitchers duel with Bob Porterfield, who allowed only five hits.

The Orioles scored both their runs in the seventh inning.

With two on, Clint Courtney doubled, scoring Vern Stephens and advancing Bob Kennedy to third. Then Bobby Young, pinch-hitting for Billy Hunter, singled Kennedy across the plate.

The lone Washington run came in the first, after Eddie Yost opened with a double and went to third when Johnny Pesky grounded out. Coleman then tried to pick Yost off base but threw wild, and Yost scampered home.

The defeat was Porterfield's eighth against 10 victories.

Coleman now has a 10-12 record. Torgerson tripled in the eighth inning and scored on Smoky Burgess' fly ball as Philadelphia Phillies defeated Boston Red Sox Wednesday night to move into the National League's fourth spot.

Willie Jones of the Phils hit the first pitch offered him in the third inning into the left field stands for his eighth homer of the season.

Torgerson hit his eighth inning three-bagger off reliever Frank Smith, who had just come into the ball game as the third hurler used by Cincinnati. Burgess' flyout was a long ball hit to Wally Post against the right-field wall.

The win went to Herm Weh-mier, who relieved starter Curt Simmons in the eighth with one out.

Coach Percy Norman of Vancouver, directing the twice-daily workouts of the swimmers, was beaming with optimism Wednesday at the Empire pool.

"Don't write us off in the swims," said Norman. "We might surprise a lot of people. We have a good bunch of kids and anybody who thinks he can pick the winners is only guessing wildly."

Norman was particularly enthusiastic about 17-year-old Gladys Priestley of Verdun, Que., free-

style swimmer. Gladys has cut 17 seconds off her time made in the 400-yard free-style at the trials three weeks ago and now is swimming the 400 in 5:21.8.

Both Whittall, also of Montreal, had clipped off nine seconds and her time now is 5:22.

Virginia Grant of Toronto, who will swim in the 110-yard free-style spring, has a full second off her time. In the men's section, George Park, the tall Hamilton policeman, has trimmed his trials time for the 100 by at least two full seconds and is doing a solid 58 seconds.
