Local and Other Items.

A GREAT LOBSTER.-A monster lobster was taken at Canso, N. S., last week by one of C. B. Whitman's smacks. Its dimensions are: length from snout to end of tail, 19 inches; from end of feelers to end of tail, 32 inches; length of claw, 17 inches from claw to claw, extended, 38 inches; weight, 12 pounds.

TEA PARTY.-The congregation of St. Joseph's Church, Kelly's Cross, intend to have a grand tea party on the beautiful church grounds on July 5th. An opportunity will be afforded visitors to see the artistic interior finish of the new church which is conceded to be the finest specimen of architecture in the Province. All kinds of amusement will be provided by the committee in charge and a day of genuine enjoyment is assured to all who patronize this tea.

A COMING SOLAR ECLIPSE.-The next total solar eclipse will take place on May 28, 1900, and will be visible at places on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean. In order that the observations may be made in as useful and systematic a manner as possible astronomers are already considering plans for observing the phenomenon. The two points where it is suggested that the conditions are most favorable for the observations are in the South, in the vicinity of Norfolk, Va., and in Portugal.

AFTER MANY YEARS.-Twenty seven years ago, while camping in the woods in Lower Lraro, Mr. Benjamin McNut, lost a silver open-faced watch, and about eight months ago Mr. John Hennessey, while traveling through the same place, found it, and singular to say, the watch was in a good state of preservation. Mr. W. N. Mills repaired the watch for Mr. Hennessey, charging him one dollar, showing how little the watch was damaged by the exposure of twenty-seven years of wind and weather. -Truro Times-Guardian.

FELL FIVE HUNDRED FEET.-Howard Twiss, son of a former mayor of Kansas City, Kan., attempted to make a balloon ascension and a parachute drop at Chelsea Park, a suburban resort. He ascended about five hundred feet when the balloon capsized. The parachute failed to work, and young Twiss, the balloon and the parachute tumbled to the earth. Luckily, the young aeronaut fell first into the branches of a big tree through which he tumbled to the ground. The doctors say he will live.

THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE.-The Pall Mall Gazette says: If some recently published statistics are to be trusted, the English language is developing more than any other past or present. While the German contains 80,600 words, the Italian 45,000, the French 30,000, and the Spanish only 20,000, Dr. Murray's English dictionary is expected to contain no fewer than a quarter million words, more than half of which have come into use during the last half century. A great part of these additions are technical or scientific terms.

THE LOSSES COMPARED.-The War Department has prepared a memorandum which compares the losses in the Spanish war with those in the first year of the Civil War. The aggregate strength of the troops employed in the war with Spain was approximately 267,000, covering a period from May, 1898, to April, 1899, inclusive. During this time deaths from all causes amounted to 6,199, or 2 1/2 per cent. The mean strength for the first year of the Civil War was 276,371, and the aggregate loss by deaths from all causes was 19,159, a percentage of 6 3/4.

TO RETAIN GIBRALTAR.-England is willing to make considerable sacrifices to retain Gibraltar. A new battery has recently been made on the highest point of the rock, and the shells, weighing four and five hundred pounds, are taken up by a narrow path, on a barrow drawn by a mule and guided by a man. Frequently, it is said, mule and barrow and man have fallen over the cliff; but, says an American critic, instead of an outcry against the dangerous practice, the English gravely congratulate themselves that the accidents have not taken a more serious form, "considering that these shells are charged with powerful doses of Lyddite." The whole top of Gibraltar might have been blown off.

A FOOTBALL SCENE.-A very disgraceful scene took place at a football match at Wexford on Sunday last, when a Wexford and an Enniscorthy team met at the Black-water ground. "The Wexford Volunteers," after a determined fight, defeated the Enniscorthy "Ninety-Eights" by one goal and six points to three points. The Wexford players were set upon by the crowd and treated in a brutal fashion, knocked down and kicked, and some of them rendered unconscious. Some of the Wexford corporation, who were present in drags, were attacked by the Enniscorthy party and had to fly for their lives. A small force of police who were present were unable to do anything to stop the fight. Football in Wexford is queer sort of play.

DAIRYING TIPS.

Do not allow the boys or the dog to drive the cows from their pasture, when their udders are full, on the run. This is very bad for cows, frequently causing garget or other ailments of the udder.

Remember! Have your cows comfortable at all times. If there is a cold rain storm which would make you uncomfortable if you were out in it, have pity on the cows; do with them as you would do by yourself, and get them in a clean, dry, comfortable shelter.

Cows should always be put in the stable to be milked. Milking should not be done in the yard, where they are liable to chase each other around. When they are put in the stable they should always find a little good food there for them. That will make them willing and anxious to go in.

Well-groomed cows, clean udders and litter, and good ventilation will do much in the way of keeping the milk pure; but with all these conditions the milk should not be allowed to stand in the cow-house for any length of time after it has been drawn from the cows. The sooner it is strained and strained thoroughly the better. On many farms the milk-strainer is a most carelessly used utensil, often out of order, and not half cleaned. Examine it at once. If we are to make a success of dairying we must first of all be clean.

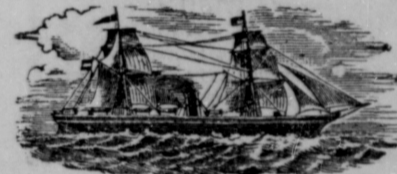
