Suggests Maritime Power Commission

Among the resolutions passed at the annual meeting of the Federation of Agriculture on Wednesday was the following dealing with rural electrification.

"Whereas, our Federation does not at this time agree with a widespread policy of State ownership of commercial business and nevertheless, we do feel that certain public utilities should and can be operated by Government bodies in the best general interests of the people and.

"Whereas, the expansion policies, the services and the rates of our present system of rural electrification are not operating or expanding to the satisfaction of the rural people of this province and.

"Whereas, we have sufficient reason to believe that an electrification system could be developed and operated on a joint basis by the governments of the three Maritime Provinces that could expand electrical facilities and provide power and equipment at considerably lower than present costs and.

"Whereas, agriculture and our province as a whole is suffering for the need of widespread and reasonably cheap electric energy which is being provided in other provinces and places where such utility is administered as a public utility.

"Be it resolved that we urge our Provincial Government to arrange for a survey and make a public report on the possibilities of generating and distributing electric power on a much larger basis under some form of a Maritime Power and Hydro Commission jointly owned and operated by the three Maritime Governments."

The resolution was moved by Mrs. E. S. Rose of East Baltic and seconded by A. Johnson of Long River.
