The regular monthly meeting of the Southern Kings Fish and Game Association was held at the Bison Restaurant Tuesday night with Mr. Ethan Stewart presiding, in the absence of the president, Mr. Gilbert Clements.

A resolution moved and passed and to be forwarded to the parent body read in effect, "be it resolved that all possible steps be taken to have the Dept. of Industries and National Resources have complete control over construction and leasing of dams of the angling waters of Prince Edward Island."

Considerable discussion followed with reference to gravel washing in streams of P.E.I. and it was the feeling of the meeting that action should be taken immediately and not to wait until the washing was over for the year.

Another matter brought to the attention of the meeting was the protection of smelts. It was the opinion of the meeting that they should receive more protection during the spawning period, and a resolution was passed that the two fisheries inspectors be contacted and have the matter brought to their attention.

Another resolution of the meeting was that the parent body be asked to contact the Dept. of Industries and National Resources with reference to repairs to the dam at the head of the Cardigan River, which is owned by them
