

P.E.I. Track, Field Club Shows At Halifax Meet

Island athletes shattered two Nova Scotia open records and the Islander Track and Field Club took the unofficial high aggregate at the Bill Hales Memorial and Nova Scotia track and field championships held in Halifax on Saturday.

Andy Arsenault gave notice that he is going to be a hard man to beat in the Canadian Championships when he reeled off his 800 in a time of 1:56. Arsenault fore past the nationally known Chris Williamson about 200 yards from the wire and went on to win by 20 yards. Andy also shattered the Nova Scotia two mile record as he copped his second win in a time of 10:04, cracking the old mark by a substantial margin.

Adele Marshbank was the other member of the 16 competition contingent that attended the meet to bring home a Nova Scotia record. Miss Marshbank hurled the discus 95' in her record breaking feat. She also won the women's shot event.

Billy MacKinnon proved that he is the top juvenile sprinter in the Maritimes for the second time in as many weeks, taking both the 100 and 200 yard dashes as well as anchoring the P.E.I. Juvenile relay teams to wins in the 440 and 880 yard relays. Despite a poor start MacKinnon ripped off a 10.3 in the 100 but the highlight of his day was probably in the 880 yard relay. Behind 20 yards when he received the baton, MacKinnon stormed back to catch the leader and give the Island team the first relay victory of the day. Billy also took a third in the broad jump.

Summerside's Dave Bagiole also gave an excellent demonstration of his running abilities as he swept both the 100 and 200 yard dashes in the Midget mens division as well as competing seconds in the high jump, broad jump and triple jump. He was also a member of the relay team.

The Islanders swept the open men's weight events and also took points in the high jump and broad jump events. Burly Bob Simmonds copped his specialty, the discus, and also won the javelin with a toss of 168 feet, 10 feet further than the Island's second place finisher Chris Annett. Simmonds also scored in the shot coming third behind RCAF Summerside's Bob Smith who won the event. Chris Annett won the Open mens high jump with a leap of 6' and Paul Mullins of Summerside picked up a second in the open mens broad jump. Don Lothian, competing in the juvenile mens class won his specialty the 400, in a time of 52.2 and also ran with both victorious relay teams.

Two of the best baseball teams in the Maritimes were seen on the Island for a good many years' was the way coach Charlie Ryan described the contests between the Charlottetown Legion Juniors and the visiting team from New Waterford, N.S. played at Memorial Field Saturday and yesterday.

The two teams battled to a 2-2 stalemate in Saturday's game. Bobby Stull started for the Legion and after giving up two hits was replaced on the mound by national junior team elect Billy Weatherly. Billy went the rest of the way for the Legion showing why he is to go to Mexico City as he allowed the visitors only two hits in the next seven innings. Both teams failed to push a run across the plate after the first inning. The highlight of the game came in the top of the ninth inning as New Waterford loaded the bases on two hits and an error. Weatherly threw his way out of the jam, however, by striking out the next three Nova Scotia batters.

The New Waterford-Olands nipped the Legion in yesterday's game by a score of 2-1 despite the three hit pitching of Funnel MacLean for the Legion. The local team outhit the visitors seven to three but the inability of the Legion to put together a rally was obvious. The New Waterford team scored their winning run when Stelle stole home in the third inning as MacLean went into his windup.
