East Kings Group Wants Trawlers

The fisheries committee of the Eastern Kings Resources Development Group had recommended that two 85-foot steel trawlers be built and located at Souris to stimulate the local fishing industry.

In a report to the Provincial Resources Development Council, which met at Elerslie Tuesday night, William Pierce, chairman of the fisheries committee, accompanied by Earl Lewis and Paul Gallant, asked the over-all council to study the proposal.

SET UP COMMITTEE

The council, under chairman Robert Parent, referred the matter to provincial research director, Hartwell Daley, who will set up a committee to work with the Souris group on the matter.

Federation of Agriculture secretary, Lincoln Dewar, proposed a research project which would entail an examination of the province's agricultural resources. This proposal was referred to Mr. Daley for study.

George V. Fraser, Charlottetown, appeared in connection with the establishment of a Highland college in the province. He was referred to the Centennial Committee, which is planning 1964 celebrations.

OUTLINES WORK

The meeting was held at the federal biological station at Elerslie. Station superintendent Roy Drinnan, host for the evening, outlined the work of the committee for the council. Lunch was served by the Bliford Women's Institute.

Next meeting of the council will be held Dec. 13 in Rustico.

Fertilizer Plant's Operation In S' side Causes Complaint

SUMMERSIDE — Fifty-eight residents in the vicinity of the Canada Packers fertilizer plant in Summerside East complained in a petition to the town council Monday evening against storage of the fertilizer chemicals outside their plant, and in the same petition asked the council to have the concrete control blasting operations with in the plant due to some damage caused in nearby homes.

Discussion of the matter by council indicated that the plant manager and some of the councillors had visited the site before the company started its loading operations, and preparations made by the company, together with assurances given at that time, seemed satisfactory.
