Self-Centered Attitude Is Neurotic Response

Dear Mary Haworth: I am a 70 in a psychiatric hospital. I read in your column the story of the boy, 22, whose girl friend was a bride, and whose father having committed suicide is very excited and artistic, he says, with deep compassion for people and animals. She is warm and kind and wonderful with children and understanding of him. But she is "changeable" and has broken off with him eight times in a little over a year and now wants a final break, by having unfaithful to him, she says.

I have learned that people are not as kind and of a definite lack of communication with others.

You advised him to drop her. I am glad that not all so-called "normal" people feel as you do about emotional illness. How would you react to a broken home? Would you feel you had to test anyone who professed love?

I have written about marriage since I have gotten sick. But I hope I can find someone who will understand my illness, rather than condemn it.

My problem isn't like here, it's a neurotic response. I am only a symptom of the problem. I hope you never have to read my story and write about things you don't understand. And I hope the poor girl who is married by taking your advice. I know you can't understand, but I can even forgive "normal" people.

You see us as selfish, uncaring people when in reality we are quite different. We may not be pleased from our inconsistencies, as we feel others don't really care. I hope people will be more understanding, so that we can some day come to trust the world—B.L.

Dear B.L.: Your letter is interesting and makes a good deal of sense. But it offers a very self-centered view, which is characteristic of all persons of any age who need analytic help in order to grow beyond the infantile or kindergarten level of feeling at which they've bogged down.

One can't expect the infant or the kindergarten child to see life, in depth and perspective, with clarity, as "normal" adults do. And I think the difference in your infant mind, in respect to B.L.'s problem, is the difference between a childish short-sighted view (yours), and a more mature, perceptive, objective view (mine).

In your vexed criticism of my reply to the boy fascinated by the girl who keeps him off balance with her instability, you identify with the girl and argue as if you felt disparaged and misunderstood. You fall in her mind that I am counselling the boy about his problem: I am not counselling the girl at all. She didn't ask my advice. And she is not you.

I was shooting the boy what he must do (and why) to save himself in the situation. Admit-

5 to 6 lbs. corned beef, preferable brisket

2 bay leaves

12 new potatoes, peeled

12 young carrots, peeled

12 small onions, peeled or 1 white onions, drained

In estimating time to cook corned beef, allow 30 min. for each lb.

Put corned beef and bay leaves into cold water; bring slowly to boil and skim off any foam. Taste water; if very salty, discard and cover meat with fresh cold water.

Use Spring Vegetables 'Lighten' Corned Beef

"ALTHOUGH corned beef cooked with vegetables is considered healthy and nutritious, suitable only for cold weather, it can also be featured in a dinner during the summer or fall," remarked the Chef.

"At this season we can use spring vegetables, arranging the sliced corned beef and cooked vegetables on a large platter with a heavy dressing of mayonnaise and a dash of lemon juice and a dash of salt."

And to add marked flavor comes the cooking cabbage with the meat's serve with a refreshing sauerkraut salad.

"Corned beef is what might be called an old-fashioned food," I observed. "To carry out this theme the dessert should be old-fashioned, too, such as crisp cross apple pie or lemon soufflé with half-thaw frozen raspberries or sliced homemade or purchased doughnuts."
