Early Action Expected On Shaw's Appointment

New developments are expected this week in the long-standing rumour that Premier Walter R. Shaw will be elevated to the post of lieutenant-governor of Prince Edward Island.

Reliable Progressive Conservative sources say that Premier Shaw will announce his retirement as leader of the government this week and his appointment to the governorship will be announced within a few days of his retirement.

Lieutenant-Governor F.W. Hynman will continue in office until a successor is sworn in, however, his normal five-year term in office ends March 31, after which the office is open for re-appointment.

Lending support to the suggestion that Premier Shaw will about to retire as head of the government was a tip from a cabinet minister who said seven days "watch for something to happen near the end of the week. He would not go far, however, to admit that 'something' is the premier's retirement.

For the past six months, there has been considerable speculation that Premier Shaw has been made and that proper timing is awaited before it is announced.

Retirement of the premier would mean that an acting-premier would be appointed to direct government affairs through the present session of the Legislature. Later on in the year there would likely be a convention to choose a new party leader.

Pearson Has Promise Of Nuclear Warheads

OTTAWA (CP) — Liberal leader Pearson said Monday that if he becomes prime minister after the April 8 general election, he will announce to make effective nuclear weapons in Canada's possession will be returned without delay.

He made the assertion in a letter to members of Canadian forces overseas and distributed to the press here by the Liberal national campaign headquarters.

He said the Conservative government has committed Canada to a role in collective defence which requires the use of nuclear weapons, "as well as in Europe."

"Our forces now have these warheads," his letter says, "but the government refuses to arm them with nuclear warheads, so they are ineffective."

The Liberal leader said that if he is given the responsibility of leading the Canadian government after April 8, "this country's commitment to her Allies will immediately be honored."

"The ammunition to make of the nuclear weapons in our possession will be acquired without delay."

Mr. Pearson said services for their support on behalf of the Liberal candidate in the election will be "where their votes will be cast."

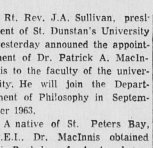
The spacecraft, launched 7½ months ago, is to approach Mars by the middle of June.

Teacher Named To SDU Faculty

DR. R. V. J. Sullivan, president of St. Dunstan's University yesterday announced the appointment of Dr. Patrick A. MacInnis to the faculty of the university. He will join the Department of Philosophy in September 1963.

In May, 1961, he completed his doctoral dissertation in August, 1963, he will be awarded his doctorate.

Outlook Good For Settlement In Paper Strike

NEW YORK (AP) — Negotiations between the United Paperworkers and the International Brotherhood of Bookbinders to settle a strike by 300 union typesetters and 320 printers in New York's newspaper industry, prepared if the deadlock persisted to recommend peace terms to the closed shop.

Mayor John Lindsay stood successfully to end the industry's key dispute between publishers and the closed shop and the AFL-CIO International Typographical Union.

The AFL-CIO voted Sunday to end their walkout, effective Monday. The I.T.U. Local 1 withdraws its pickets.

On all sides there were high hopes that the eight closed newspapers would be back on the streets within hours or at most a few days.

NEW YORK (AP) — Members of two American families received the best of all possible news Monday: their loved ones were alive after a near miraculous survival of a plane crash in the cold winds of Canada's frozen north.

"I'm so wrought up I don't know what to do," said Mrs. Helen Klaben, whose husband was with her when she was broken by sob. "The poor child, she's really suffering. I'd like to go just think God she's alive," Mrs. Klaben said.

He is judge of the northern, Herefords and Aberdeens Angus.

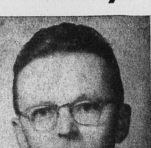
Sub-Zero Weather, Starvation Battle

WHITEHORSE, Y.T. (CP) — A young American woman and a Mexican pilot who survived 50 days of starvation and sub-zero weather after their light plane crashed into a timbered mountain side in northern British Columbia were rescued Monday and brought to hospital here.

Heleen Klaben, 21, of Brooklyn, N.Y., and pilot Ralph Flores, 42, of San Bruno Calif., reached here at 4:30 p.m. after being picked up by a Canadian Pacific Airlines plane at Watson Lake 240 miles southeast and brought to hospital here.

"I just want to go home, get married and have babies," said Miss Klaben as she joked with reporters on the plane bringing her here.

Suffering from a left arm fracture and an injured leg which was affected by gangrene, she told the order from a stretcher.



NEVER GAVE UP

"We never gave up at any time," said Flores who ignored his own rib injuries several times he believed fractured—as he fought the elements to rig a makeshift shelter and save his passenger.

The two were on a flight from Whitehorse to Fort St. John, B.C., on Feb. 4. Flores said they were blown off course into a narrow valley between peaks of 6,500 and 7,500 feet.

He piled into a heavily wooded mountain, 20 miles south of the regular air route near Aeroplex Lake.

Watson Lake is 225 miles northwest of Edmonton and Whitehorse is 225 miles north and west on the Alaska Highway.

A Whitehorse General Hospital, Dr. Nesta James reported soon after the survivors arrived that both were suffering from frostbite and hypothermia. She said they were doing as well as could be expected for two cans of fruit and two cans of sardines that they had with them.

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
