**FIXED LIGHT IN GASPE BAY.**

**T**HE Trinity House at Quebec has given Notice that during the season the navigation is open, a Light will be exhibited on the Peninsula in Gaspé Bay, 12 miles N. W. by N. from Capé Gaspé.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 40 feet above the level of the sea, with the following bearings from it:—

- Cape Haldimand, South.
- Gaspé Basin, W. ½ S.

The light is intended to serve as a guide to vessels passing between Sandy Beach and the main land opposite.

[All Bearings are Magnetic. Variation 26° 20' Westerly in 1867.]
