

Whitlock's 300th Goal May Come Tonight In Game With Atlantics

The Halifax Atlantics play the Islanders tonight at the Forum in a game which is surrounded with as much drama and as much uncertainty as any game ever played in the Maritime Major Hockey League.

The drama part surrounds the Islanders great centre ice player Roy "Buck" Whitlock. The shifty centreman needs only one goal to enter the 300 goal circle of Maritime hockey and be the first player ever to perform such a feat.

The uncertainty has to do with Al Millar and the Atlantics. The Islanders had not received any word on the status of Millar last night from League President Judge J. Elliott Hudson. They expect word about Millar this morning.

The betting here is that Millar will be eligible to play tonight. If Judge Hudson intended to suspend the player he would have notified the Islanders in time to procure a replacement for tonight's game.

It would also appear that the goalie's actions did not warrant any further suspension. He has been cleared of an assault charge in a civil court and he has also been under suspension for two and two-third games.

The Atlantics themselves are cloaked in a curtain of uncertainty. If the Atlantics, as reported by a Halifax newspaperman earlier in the week, dropped out of the League for 15 minutes last Saturday, they are an "Out-law" team.

The Atlantics could only regain admission to the League by securing the favorable votes of two other teams in the League and this might be a tough proposition. They would also have to forfeit their \$1,000 bond for dropping out of the League.

Boston Bruins Defeat Detroit Red Wings 3-1

BOSTON, (AP)—Fleming Mackell provided two of the Boston goals as the Bruins snapped the top-place Detroit Red Wings' National Hockey League unbeaten string at eight games Thursday night with a 3-1 victory. The triumph, only the second the Bruins have gained in 11 tries against the Stanley Cup champions this season, moved Boston into a fourth-place tie with the idle Toronto Maple Leafs.

Mackell's first marker came during the 14th minute of play when, after taking a forward pass from Eddie Sandford, he blasted goalie Terry Sawchuk with a rifle-like angle shot from 25 feet.

The Red Wings stormed back 19 seconds later and Red Sinclair polished off a power play by caging John Wilson's rebound.

Mackell clinched matters during the second minute of the middle session by slapping in Johnny Pearson's passout from the right corner. The masked player, playing with a fractured jaw, set up a goal for Joe Klukay during the 18th minute of the same period. During the finale, Pearson's detected presence in the Detroit crease nullified a shot defenceman Warren Godfrey fired past Sawchuk from about six feet out.

For the third straight game Detroit's great Gordie Howe, who is leading the league with 72 points, was denied the 200th goal of his major league career, a total gained by only seven players still active.

Davey Says He Learned Lesson In Gavilan Fight

CHICAGO, (AP)—"I got my real college education last night."

Gavilan, now eyeing the middleweight division and a possible bout in Montreal against Johnny Bratton within six weeks, received \$81,517.27 for his 27-minute, 10-round TKO of Davey.

The net gate was \$211,454.71, from which Gavilan got 40 per cent and Davey 20 after ring expenses and city tax.

Davey was keenly disappointed in his failure to stand up under the flailing blows of the Cuba Keed. He declared: "I learned an awful lot."

"I think I can fight my way back up to the top. I'm not quitting. I'll be ready the next time around."

Gavilan, himself, said Davey was "very fast and maybe in two-three years, he be good fighter." Davey will be 28 his next birthday, May 3.

A bout with the winner of the March 13 New York bout between Vince Martinez and Chico Vejar is reported in store for Davey, who twice pummeled Vejar for easy victories.

Gavilan, who was held to a draw by Bratton in an overweight match.

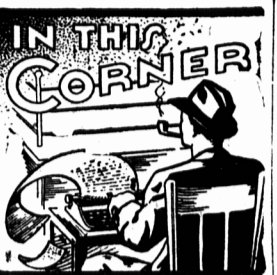

Reardon Scores 53 Points As Saints Defeat Abbies 94-41 In Hoop Encounter

Deadeye Jack Reardon, who would be an asset to any College basketball team in the Dominion or in the United States, last night gave the most impressive scoring display of his career by racking up 53 points in an Island League hoop game against the Abbies.

The tall, American-born College student, who has been scoring with twenty-five field goals and three free throws in the greatest scoring spurge ever witnessed by an individual player here.

Reardon scored well over half his team's points as the Saints defeated the Abbies 94-41. The win was the fifth for the Saints in five starts in the Island League this year.

Reardon's scoring displays this year have been nothing short of amazing. The Saints have played two intercollegiate games and Reardon has scored 72 points for an average of 36 points a game. This is a figure unheard of in Maritime intercollegiate basketball.

One of the amazing facts of Reardon's play is that he never has a poor night although he is the most closely guarded player on the court. Only on one occasion this year has he scored less than 20 points. That night he had 18.
