

Quality Of Table Potatoes Impaired By Seed Program

That too much stress was being placed on the growing of seed potatoes was the opinion expressed by Joseph Campbell, (Liberal), Third Kings speaking on the Draft Address Tuesday.

Mr. Campbell felt that the quality of Island tablestock was suffering as a result of a concentrated program to produce seed of a certain type. "We do not have table potatoes of the same quality as we used to have a number of years ago."

Going further, Mr. Campbell stated that the emphasis has been placed on growing varieties that will give a good yield with little or no thought being given to the quality of the tuber produced. "I think if we were to concentrate more on quality and less on production, we would find a ready market for our potatoes in any part of the world," he said.

Mr. Campbell complimented the speaker upon his elevation to the high position to which he was appointed. He lauded the achievement of the House Leader in his success at the polls in the last election and also congratulated the Leader of the Opposition whom he was glad to see back in his seat.

Mr. Campbell said there had been considerable discussion on marketing but expressed the opinion that any marketing scheme

would not work unless it is consolidated with the other Maritime Provinces. "For us to try to dictate prices and supplies," he said, "was like the tail trying to wag the dog."

PULP WOOD

Mr. Campbell was not pleased with the prices being paid for pulpwood. He said that in 1932 producers were getting as high as \$17.50 a cord for pulpwood landed at the car. "Since that time it has gone down to \$9.00 a cord at the roadside. This reduction in price had occurred in spite of the fact that there have been consistent increases in the cost of newsprint."

Mr. Campbell said that on his insistence a survey of prices being paid in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick had been made and it was found that \$16 a cord was being paid in New Brunswick and \$13 in Nova Scotia. Since the survey was made, he noted that the price for Island pulpwood has risen to \$10 a cord at the roadside. "But I still believe that we are not getting enough for our pulp wood—to use a slang expression, I think there is something fishy about the whole thing," he said.

"Forests are being depleted and if the farmer is going to get only nine or ten dollars a cord for his wood, he is not making wages and

is giving his wood away for nothing," he contended.

Mr. Campbell complimented the Minister of Highways and his predecessor for the pavement laid between Cardigan and Dundas. "We have waited a long time for this and the people are very grateful but we would like to see the eight mile stretch between Dundas and Fortune Bridge completed. It would benefit more than 130 families," Mr. Campbell said.

"Fifty years ago the people of this area were promised a railroad but they never got it and I think their chances of getting it now are pretty slim," he said.

"The snow removal program is progressing quite favorably in our District," said Mr. Campbell. "I know that there are people who expect the impossible of the plow operators but on the whole we have little reason to complain."

Mr. Campbell thanked the Government for the assistance in the Dundas Flowing Match has been receiving each year. He told the House that the directors planned in expanding the Fair this year to include a midway and other forms of entertainment. He hoped that if at all possible the electric power would be available in the District in time for the plowing work so that the day's activities could be carried on after dark.
