Local and Other Items.

POLICE COURT.—This morning His Honor fined David Bell \$10 for assaulting Henry Myers, a Salvation Army Cadet, and gave Martin Flynn \$4 or 20 days for drunkenness.

MAYFLOWERS.—Mr. Albert Bridge, of Sydney Mines, C. B., on Sunday last, picked a bunch of Mayflowers almost in full bloom, on the farm of Mr. R. S. Bridge, at that place. This is one of the most unusual things heard of for a long time.—*North Sydney Herald.*

PROMOTED.—Mr. J. Trainor, for several years past teller and latterly accountant in the Merchants Bank of Halifax, this city, having been promoted to a position in the head office, left for Halifax this morning. Mr. Trainor was a very competent official and was deservedly popular. We wish him every success in his new field of labor.

OYSTERS.—A shipment of oysters from Bedeque, P. E. I., was received here yesterday by the steamer Stanley via Picton. This is the first time for years that oysters have been received here from that place in January, the last of November being the latest heretofore.—*Ex. Chronicle.*

A BIG LIFT.—One night last week an express parcel containing \$1,000 in Union Bank bills was taken from the Dominion express office at Verdun, Man. The agent is not certain whether the money was put in the safe or not, but at any rate it is missing. The manager of the express company has offered a reward of \$300 for the recovery of the money.

MELBOURNE KING.—The *Canadian Sportsman* says: We hear that A. L. Slipp, of Truro, N. S., intends to prepare his stately stallion Melbourne King (1867) by Mambrino King, for fast work next season, and is confident that the handsome trotter will make a good showing. Melbourne King inherited much of the good looks of his noted sire and a fast mark would be the crowning glory. We hope that he will get inside the charmed circle.

LEFT WITH THE BOODLE.—Last month George Algernon Jefferson Anderson, a copyist, visited Dundela, Ontario, fell in love with the school-mistress, who reciprocated his affection, and, after borrowing money from her to fit himself out, they were married. She drew her savings from a bank, and deposited them in Anderson's hands to fit out the house, but he quietly started westward, and the lady mourns a husband and much wealth.

THE JERSEY.—Nova Scotia farmers are beginning to learn the value of the Jersey as a dairy cow. The Lunenburg agricultural society has recently purchased from B. W. Chipman's Jersey stock farm a fine Jersey bull, Star of Mifford. Joseph Allison, who has started a dairy farm at Sackville, near Bedford, found he could not make gilt-edged butter without the Jersey, and he has also purchased a nice pair from Mr. Chipman as the foundation of a herd.

BREACH OF PROMISE.—St. John is to have a breach-of-promise case on trial there in a few days. The parties belong in Sussex, and both have moved in good society. The defendant, Ora P. King, is a lawyer of some prominence, and the plaintiff, Miss McLean, is a near relative of a leading hotel keeper. She makes affidavit that under solemn promise of marriage the defendant seduced her, and she has caused an order of arrest to issue against him. She wanted \$10,000, but the judge would not issue it for more than \$1,000. The defendant, who denies that any promise of marriage was made, will make application to Judge Tuck to set aside the order of arrest.

MAKING AN ISLAND.—The Cape Ann *Advertiser* says: Mr. G. E. Clark, of Belfast, Me., advocates a plan to mitigate the danger to the fishing fleet on Georges, his proposition being for the State of Massachusetts to fill 50 old hulks with stone ballast, tow them to the highest part of Georges shoal, and sink them. The originator claims that "in two years this will form an island, constantly growing higher and larger. Thereon can be built a lighthouse or place of refuge. This island will constantly grow by the action of the sea. The laden hulks must be sunk in a line, close together, and nature will do the rest."

A NOVEL ACTION.—Advices from Simcoe, Ont., say that a novel action is threatened there over a difficulty arising from the stationing committee of the Niagara Methodist Conference having sent a minister to Simcoe in spite of the protests of the people. The members of the church have been in the habit of holding weekly prayer meetings in a school room on an evening not otherwise occupied. The trustees are now threatened with an injunction by a leading legal firm in Toronto to restrain them from allowing the people to pray or engage in any act of religious services in the school room or church.

SUPREME COURT.—The case of Cole vs. Biggar is occupying the attention of the Court to-day, and will probably not be concluded until to-morrow.

MILITARY.—The last *Canada Gazette* contains notice of the appointment of retired Major George L. Doherty as Paymaster and Superintendent of Militia Stores for Military District No. 12, (P. E. I.), from 23rd of November, 1888.

PANSY IN WINTER.—On Thursday last, says the *Agriculturist*, Mr. David Rogers picked in his open air garden, Summerside, a full blown pansy, which was not a last fall one revived, either, but a new and perfectly formed flower, green and fresh as those of summer, with bright green leaves, and several sprouts preparing to burst into flower and leaf.

VANDALISM.—One of the large panes of plate glass in the show window of Messrs. McLeod & McKenzie, London House, was shattered early on Sunday morning. It does not appear that there was an attempt at robbery. The act was probably one of unmitigated vandalism, perpetrated by one of the numerous corner-loading parties who are permitted to infest the town. We trust that the Stipendiary Magistrate will issue an order for the suppression of these corner-loading nuisances, and that a marshal will be appointed with vigor and determination enough to carry it out.

DARING BURGLARY.—On Friday morning, says the *Pioneer*, David Cork, grocer, of Summerside, woke up to find that he was minus \$22, box, papers and all. Almost invariably the cash box was taken out of the store at night, but on Thursday evening this was neglected, and in the morning the outside doors of the house were found open and the money gone. During the night a lodger had got up, opened the front door and, it is supposed, had forgotten to lock it again. The thief seeing this door open, it is thought, slipped into the hall, passed from there into the store, took the cash box, opened the door of the shop and escaped.

THE GREAT CARNIVAL.—Tremendous interest is being taken in the approaching Carnival in Montreal. The Governor-General is to inaugurate the festivities and give the entire week's programme his patronage. State Governor, Lieut.-Governors, and prominent people from all parts of the world are to view the spectacles. Letters are pouring in to the Committee from Europe and the United States enquiring for particulars. The committee are making extraordinary preparations for a magnificent carnival. Those who do not go to Montreal for a week of wondrous merriment will, we hear, find the events in all their marvellous beauty reproduced in the Carnival Number of the *Montreal Star*, which it is said will be a perfectly stunning number.

DIED UNDER CHLOROFORM.—About four o'clock on Friday afternoon, says the *Halifax Chronicle*, Errington Gibson was at work at a moulding machine in his mill, and by some means the cutter of the machine caught his left hand, and the fingers and end of the thumb was thought necessary to place the injured man under chloroform to dress the wound. He had been troubled with a weak heart, and it is thought this and the shock through the accident assisted in producing the fatal result. Mr. Gibson was 49 years of age. He leaves a widow and three children—a daughter and two sons.

JUBILEE CELEBRATION.—The Summer-side papers to hand this morning contain the programme of the Rev. P. Doyle's Silver Jubilee celebration. The celebration begins on the evening of the 23rd by a concert at St. Mary's Academy, Summerside. On Thursday morning High Mass and *Te Deum* at St. Paul's Church, with sermon by Rev. D. J. G. Macdonald, followed by address and presentation. At 1 p. m., a dinner to the clergy and invited guests takes place in the Convent, after which they leave by special train for Kinkora, returning at 6.30 p. m., when the celebration will conclude with a grand display of fireworks.

MEDICAL.—A meeting of medical men was held in the Law Library on Saturday for the purpose of discussing a medical law for this Province similar to that of the other provinces of the Dominion. The following committee was appointed to prepare a law and submit it to the Legislature at the first sitting thereof, viz.: Drs. Johnson, McLeod, Conroy, Gillies and Fraser, with power to add to their number. Dr. Kelly was appointed Secretary. We regard this as a move in the right direction. This island should not be without such a law when the other Provinces have one. Our people should, to say the least, be protected from quacks to an equal extent with the other Provinces as the people of this Province are equally as intelligent as the rest of the vast Dominion.
