England and Portugal.

SALISBURY'S ULTIMATUM.

Portugal Brought to Terms.

The Pongee River Free

LONDON, April 25. Lord Salisbury, after despatching three war ships to the entrance of the Pongee River, called on Portugal to apologize for its insult to the British flag in firing on the steamer Agnes, and to forthwith carry out its treaty engagements regarding African territory, else an appeal to arms would follow. The Portuguese Cabinet yesterday accepted Lord Salisbury's ultimatum and consented to the free passage of the Pongee River.

Sir Charles and the G. T. R. A Slashing Attack on Tyler.

LONDON, April 25. Sir Charles Tupper's reply to Sir Henry Tyler's statements at the meeting of the Grand Trunk shareholders appears in the London Times to-day. Sir Charles attacks the action of the President of the Grand Trunk on every point. He says that he would have failed in his duty to Canada and to England if he had not exposed the attempt of the Grand Trunk to support the party in Canada whose policy during the recent election was Annexation. He says that Sir Henry Tyler made the fatal mistake of allowing himself to be blinded by jealousy of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Adversity now dogs his footsteps, while the Canadian Pacific steadily prospers. He regretted that assistance had been given the Grand Trunk to enable it to obtain connection with Chicago, as it is now evident that it has made the road an American institution. In concluding, Sir Charles says that Canada has a right to know whether the English shareholders of the Railway sustain Tyler and Seargeant in their admitted policy of looking to Washington.

Germany's Greatest Soldier.

Death of Count Von Moltke.

BERLIN, April 25. Count Von Moltke, Germany's greatest soldier, died suddenly yesterday of heart failure. [Count Von Moltke, the great general, was born in Mecklenburg in the year 1800. He was the son of a Danish general. He entered the Prussian service in 1822, and was employed by the Sultan of Turkey from 1835 to 1839 in improving Turkish fortifications. Here he saw active service in the war against the Kurds and also in Egypt. In 1858 he became chief of the general staff of the Prussian army, and planned the operations of the wars with Denmark (1864) and Austria (1866.) But it was the war with France in 1870 that made his name famous and showed the world what a great general he was. It was his system of attack which gained the continuous victories of the German army. He was successively made count, general field-marshal and life member of the Upper House of the German parliament.]

Women Left to Drown.

A Cowardly and Dastardly Act

ST. JOHN, N.B., April 25. A fresheet of the St. John River pouring into this harbor, caused a party of twelve in a row-boat returning from a dance in Charlton yesterday morning to foul the bow of the steamer Dominion. All were tossed into the furious tide. Two ladies were drowned. One lady and all the men were rescued. The men acted a brutal part and saved themselves, leaving the ladies to drown. The indignation here is intense.

A WOMAN MURDERED.

The Murderer Disappears.

NEW YORK, April 25. Last night a strange man and a discolored woman were assigned a room in a East River Hotel, New York. This morning, when the room was forced open, the disembowelled remains of the woman were found on the bed. The man had mysteriously disappeared.

OTTAWA, April 25. The range of lights established at Darnley Point, P. E. I., has been enlarged so that the lights now show not only in the line of the range but also north-westwardly along the north bar at the entrance to Richmond Bay.

An Embezzler Caught.

HALIFAX, April 25. Piggot, a Texas embezzler, was arrested yesterday, about to take the steamer for England. He had sold out his mortgaged property in San Antonio and skipped with the proceeds.
