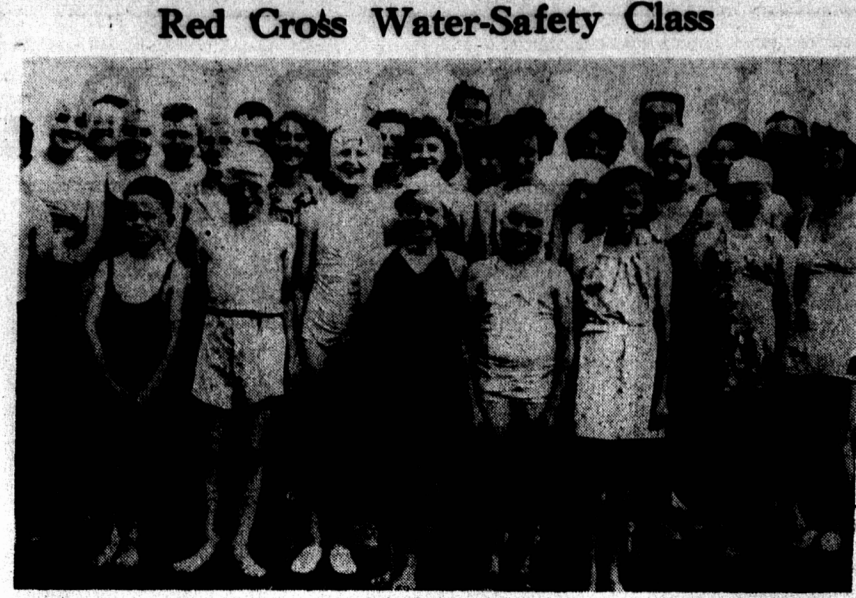
by Mrs. Edmund Gallant. Dainty refreshments were served by the hostess.
