Political Twist Is Given Chinese Child's Activity

TOKYO (AP)—"Paper tiger, bang, bang. Paper tiger, bang, bang."

The children sang in unison, pointing toy machine-guns and rifles at imaginary capitalists and revisionists—the "paper tigers" of the song.

A recent Japanese visitor to Communist China described this scene in a kindergarten there. It was part of the cradle-to-the-grave indoctrination that the Mao Tse-tung regime is imparting to the country.

Children do not escape it, in school or out. They draw pictures of what they think United States bomber pilots look like. They play in parks where the amusements have a political twist.

A typical carnival handgrip machine—squeeze it as hard as you can and try to ring the bell—is fitted with a plaster head of U.S. President Johnson. When a youngster squeezes the handgrip, he can imagine himself wringing the neck of the president.

Despite the ragged look of the clothes, visitors to mainland China say, the children are bright-eyed and healthy looking. Apparently the state makes sure they get food and medical attention.

It also tries to keep them off

the streets by maintaining "children's palaces" or houses in different parts of the big cities. These palaces open after school and on Sundays for spare-time activities with a political touch. When the children grow up they may enter the Pioneers and wear red scarves around their necks. These are seen everywhere.

Later they may go into the Young Communist League or the more recent and prominent youth force—the Red Guards.

Will the indoctrination stick? On some it probably will. But there are signs it is wearing off from some youths who have grown up in the 17 years since the Communists came to power.

The current purge in Communist China has brought an unusual official admission from Peking that possibly five out of 100 university students in Peking oppose the regime. Universities have been closed for six months to permit authorities to prepare new entrance rules.

Anglicans Said Opposed To Union

WINNIPEG (CP)—The editor of an independent Anglican newspaper predicts that "hundreds" of church members will leave the Anglican Church rather than participate in a union with the United Church of Canada.

Rev. Maurice Hardman of Winnipeg, owner and editor of The Communicator, says in an interview that these catholic-minded Anglicans are now deciding whether to form a continuing Anglican Church or other catholic communions such as the Orthodox Church or Polish National Church.

These people, like himself, "cannot see any satisfactory merger with the United Church that would not involve the United Church's return to those beliefs it overthrew at the Reformation," Mr. Hardman says.

Mr. Hardman, who resigned as editor of the Rupert's Land News last year during a dispute over the Principles of Union between the Anglican and United churches, says he expects the two churches to unite in five years but it will split the Anglican Church.

Mr. Hardman says he knows one Anglican priest who has become a Roman Catholic layman.

Norway, Sweden Said Unlikely To Join ECM

SRASBOURG, France (Reuters)—Norwegian and Swedish parliamentarians assured British colleagues Sunday their countries are unlikely to join the European Common Market without Britain.

The assurances came at a meeting of European Free Trade Association member countries after a Danish delegate confirmed press reports that his country wants Norway and Sweden to join it in seeking Common Market membership.

The two Scandinavian opposition parliamentarians, Centre party member Bjarne Undheim of Norway and Swedish Social Democrat Lennart Geger, stressed that they were not speaking for their governments.

British MPs had asked for clarification of reports that Denmark is planning a Nordic initiative to seek Common Market membership with or without Britain.

UNITY EXISTS

OTTAWA (CP)—External Affairs Minister Martin told a group of United States travel writers Saturday night it is an injustice to both Canada and the U.S. to believe they cannot live together as equals. Speaking at a banquet meeting of the American Society of Travel Writers, Mr. Martin said Canada's roots are deep in both Europe, through English and French settlers, and in the U.S. through the Loyalist settlers who left the Thirteen Colonies.

New Cabinet Portfolio About To Be Created

OTTAWA (CP)—A new cabinet portfolio to protect consumers and regulate business practices will be created this week as part of a government reorganization.

The portfolio of registrar-general of Canada is among six new ones scheduled to be proclaimed into law by cabinet order, likely today.

The covering legislation was passed by Parliament in June, but the proclamation has been delayed since then by administrative problems and the serious illness of Privy Council President Favreau.

A host of government agencies and branches have switched to new departments and moved into new Ottawa headquarters in the last few months.

Mr. Favreau was designated by Prime Minister Pearson as his choice for registrar-general last spring, but no appointment is expected for several weeks.

There is considerable speculation in Liberal circles that Mr. Favreau may resign from the cabinet and from the leadership of the party's Quebec wing for health reasons.

TAKEN TO HOSPITAL
He was taken to the Ottawa General Hospital two weeks ago suffering from pneumonia, overwork and complications. His doctor has forbidden visitors.

The hospital reports that Mr. Favreau's condition is improving, but that he will need several more weeks of complete rest.

The registrar-general's department will administer anti-combine, bankruptcy, patent and copyright laws and draft new legislation to protect consumers.

The other ministers involved in the administrative shuffle are scheduled to be sworn in this week under their new titles.

Jean Marchand becomes minister of manpower and immigration; Jean Luc Pepin, energy, mines and resources; Ar-

thur Laing, northern development and Indian affairs and E. J. Benson, treasury board president.

Solicitor-General Larry Penell will retain his title but assume formal responsibility for the RCMP, the penitentiary service, the parole board and other agencies formerly in the justice department.

The cabinet reorganization was announced by Mr. Pearson last Dec. 16 as a high priority measure but it ran into delays and heavy criticism in the Commons. Since the bill was passed June 6, senior civil servants have requested several postponements in its implementation to iron out technical difficulties.

Mr. Pearson told a press conference Sept. 20 that the legislation definitely would become law this week, in time for the resumption of the Parliamentary session Oct. 5.

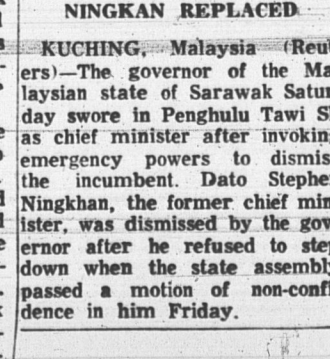

erupted about 2:40 and firemen were on the scene for about an hour. The barn was reported to be empty.
