## Beef Show Champion To Get Trophy

A trophy for the grand champion steer at the Easter Beef Show and Sale next year will be provided by Max Thompson, Tryon, it was learned at the annual meeting of the show and sale association here last night. Long-time president George Kitson, Hampshire presided and was re-elected for another year. The trophy will be a challenge trophy, but any exhibitor can win it permanently by winning it three times.

First choice for to judge next year's show is F. A. Stewart, Canada Department of Agriculture, Moncton, N.B. Second choice is Dick Huggard, N.S. Department of Agriculture, Truro, N.S.

Separate classes will be provided for cross bred steers if enough animals show to make that feasible, the meeting decided.

Livestock Products Officer Harold Heertz, Canada Department of Agriculture, reported on the quality of the animals at the 1966 show. The quality was good, he said. Mr. Heertz also discussed the point system, under which the steer show under the Harry Hays formula is operated. This does not apply to the Easter show, but it did apply to the steer show held at the Provincial Exhibition here last year.

New directors named are Frank Mutch, Earncliffe; William Hayden, Cherry Valley and Gerald Dollar, Winsloe.

Other officers re-elected were Alton Younker, Winsloe, vice-president and Dr. H. H. Kelly, Charlottetown secretary-treasurer. Speakers in addition to Mr. Heertz included Dave Peacock, provincial livestock director; Glen Cotton, provincial beef fieldman, Mr. Thompson and Mr. Kitson.

Mr. Peacock emphasized the value of beef breeders testing their animals under the ROP (record of performance) testing program, which is now available. Further information can be obtained from Mr. Peacock, P.E.I. Department of Agriculture, at Charlottetown.

## Albert Fogarty Elected UNB PC President

Albert P. Fogarty, of Souris, has been elected president of a newly-formed New Brunswick PC Association. The association was formed by university delegates in N.B., at the Progressive Conservative Party Leadership convention held in Fredericton.

Mr. Fogarty, who has been principal of Souris Regional High School for the past two years, left the province during the latter part of September to complete the course requirements for a master's degree, specializing in Canadian History. Acting principal in the absence of Mr. Fogarty is vice principal Roger Solomon, Souris.

The main purpose of the New Brunswick Progressive Conservative Association is to coordinate the activities of the various campus PC clubs, and to set up new clubs in universities, where no such organization exists.

Mr. Fogarty has promised his party's full support to the students. In May of this year, he was awarded a scholarship of \$1600 from the University of New Brunswick. The board of trustees of Souris Regional High School have granted Mr. Fogarty a year's leave of absence with the agreement he return as principal for at least a three-year period.

## Soil And Crop Meeting Monday

At 8 p.m. Monday, December 5, 1966 there will be a soil and crop improvement meeting held at Birch Court, Experimental Farm in Charlottetown.

The subject to be discussed at this meeting will be "What should livestock farmers grow, hay, silage or haylage." The speakers invited include three farmers, Charles Yeo, Sherbrooke, Leo McIsaac, Mermald and Walter Schaad, Tatamagouche. Mr. Schaad, a dairy farmer will discuss why he likes to grow haylage. At home he farms 280 acres of land. His main income is from 50 head of milking cows. Mr. Schaad, also grows 30 acres of corn, 25 acres of hay and the remaining 175 acres are used for zero grazing, haylage and some high moisture silage.

Leo McIsaac, Mermald, will be speaking on "Why he grows corn silage." He grew 165 acres of corn this year which will be fed to beef cattle.

He operates a feed lot with a capacity of 300 head of beef cattle. He also keeps approximately 4,000 laying hens.

Charles Yeo is farming 185 acres in Sherbrooke. He has approximately 50 acres of grain. His main income is from 20 head of milking cows and 1,000 laying hens. Mr. Yeo will be discussing why he grows hay.

These farmers, as can be seen from their farming operations, are highly qualified to talk on their respective farming experience. Everyone will have an opportunity to discuss their individual problems with the speakers.

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## 170 Million Towels Reported Sold In Detergent Packages

OTTAWA (CP)—Lever Brothers Ltd. has sold 170,000,000 towels in packages of powdered detergent during the last 15 years in Canada, company executives told the Senate-Commons prices committee.

John C. Lockwood, president, said the premium in the box is so popular with housewives that when the company tried to sell the same brand at a lower price, without a towel, sales dropped so rapidly the company had to take it off the market.

Lever Brothers sells the towels and detergents under the Breeze brand name. It is the company's biggest seller and the brand on which it makes its biggest profits.

The normal price is higher, to cover the cost of the towels and the company can't get as much detergent in the box as it can with other lines not carrying premiums.

The company told the committee it buys the towels "by the millions," and gets a quality towel at a price cheaper than the housewife would have to pay at retail.
