## Sir John A's Watch Given To N.S. Member

OTTAWA (Special) — A priceless political memento, a gold watch presented to Canada's first Prime Minister, Sir John A. Macdonald, has been given to a Nova Scotia M.P. Robert Coates.

The watch was given by the Conservative Working Men of Toronto in 1878. Donor of the gift is Joseph H. Pope of Westmount, Quebec whose family went to Prince Edward Island from Cornwall in England in 1819.

Although Mr. Pope was born

in Ottawa in 1886, he was taken to P.E.I. as a child and he served with the Royal Canadian Barracks in Halifax in 1915.

In sending the watch to Mr. Coates, Mr. Pope explained that while the watch was legally his, he feels it should belong to the Conservative party.

Sir John A. gave the watch to Mr. Pope's father shortly before his death in 1891. His father, Sir Joseph Pope, left the watch to his son on his death in 1928.

While born a Conservative, Mr. Pope notes that his Godfather was Sir Wilfred Laurier and he describes himself as a supporter of the Conservatives in Eastern Canada and of the New Democratic Party in Saskatchewan and British Columbia.

A strong supporter of the Red Ensign, Mr. Pope learned of the fight of the Conservatives in support of the flag and the fact that Mr. Coates has taken a

## Retired Police Officer Dies Thursday Of Heart Attack

John H. Hellofs, an ardent sportsman, long-time ardent islander, and a former member of the RCMP, died of a heart attack yesterday in the Charlottetown Hospital. He was 67.

Mr. Hellofs was born in Limburg Belgium, on Dec. 15, 1896. His family moved to Wainopie when he was in his teens, and it was in that western city that he joined the RCMP. Following training and service in the west Mr. Hellofs was transferred to Prince Edward Island, and he had lived here ever since. By the time he had reached retirement 17 years ago he had gained the rank of staff sergeant.

He served in the Canadian Army during the First World War.

Since retirement from the force Mr. Hellofs had worked with A.R. MacInnis Insurance Company and Central Creameries in Charlottetown.

He was a past president of

the Belvedere Golf Club, and served on the executive of that organization for many years. In addition he was a keen fisherman, hunter and courier.

Mr. Hellofs never married. He is survived by four sisters and three brothers, all still in western Canada.

His remains are now resting at the Hennessey Funeral Home, from where the funeral will take place Saturday morning to Saint Dunstan's Basilica for Requiem High Mass.

The RCMP announced last night that six "Mounties" will act as pallbearers at the funeral in addition Supt. McNeill and Staff Sgt. M. MacKinnon will act as official mourners, and Sgt. Mel H. G. Chipman will represent the force.

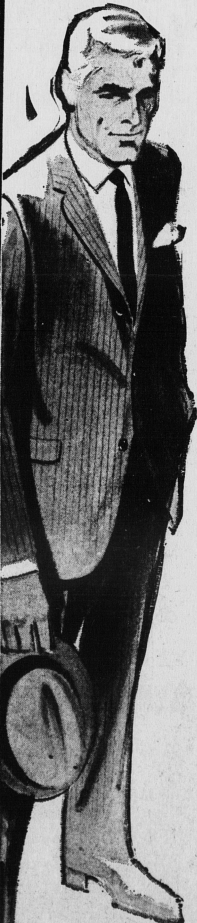
