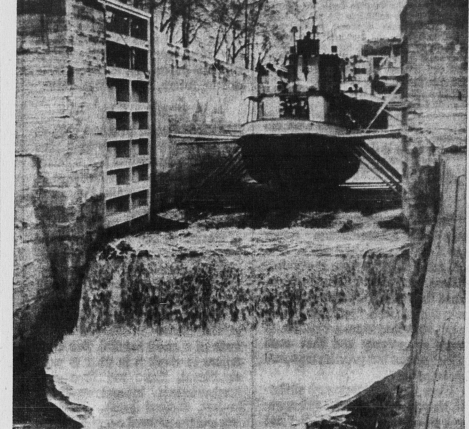


'Side Store Safe Looted Saturday

A daring early afternoon burglary in the heart of the Summerside business district Saturday night, resulted in the theft of \$1,200 after thieves smashed open a safe from the Barbara Ann Dress Shoppe in the MacArthur building.
The safe had been removed from the rear office of the dress shop in the basement of the building where it was forced open with a pinch bar and a long screw driver, which were left behind when the thieves fled. The safe had been locked on the corner of Water and Summer Streets.
The theft, which occurred between 12 noon and 2 o'clock is somewhat of a mystery, as two doors, believed to have been locked, bore no evidence of being jimmied and there were no windows smashed.
It is theorized by police that the thief or thieves must have hidden in the basement prior to noon-burglary closing time, which would eliminate one door. But the other door, leading into the basement from the street, was reported to have been locked by the last employee to leave the building. He had no signs of having been forced.
The theft is being investigated by Summerside police and RCMP.

It's believed that this door was the means of entry and escape. After entering through the door leading to the basement, another door, normally locked after business hours, leads to the basement and also to the rear door of the dress shop in the MacArthur building.

Xaverians Capture Coveted Purdy Cup

HALIFAX (CP) — St. Francis Xavier University X-Men defeated St. Mary's University Huskies 16-6 Saturday to win the Purdy Cup, emblematic of Atlantic Football Conference supremacy.
It was the fifth straight championship for the X-Men and marked the end of their fifth straight year of football action without a loss except for exhibition games.
About 2,000 fans watched the game which gave the X-Men a berth in the Atlantic Bowl next Nov. 24 against the Toronto Varsity Blues.
The X-Men finished the season in first place and played off for the championship with the second-place Huskies.
The winners got a two-touchdown performance from Joe Lamore and one major score from Bill Kreen. The three convert attempts were wide.

Russia Accuses China Of Aiding Imperialists

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union defended its Cuban rocket withdrawal Sunday and accused Communist China of aiding the imperialists.
The accusation was made in a page and a half article in Pravda, the Communist party organ. It was one of the toughest replies yet to Red Chinese criticism.

The article was written by Boris N. Ponomarev, member of the party central committee and one of the principal Soviet theorists. It was published on the eve of the meeting of the central committee, at which Premier Khrushchev's policy on industry, agriculture and his theme address, "How many of you have private lives?" he asked.

CHALLENGE TO YOUTH
Mr. Johnston said the challenge today is choosing the way in which young people should lead their lives. "We are made in love with wealth and power and popularity," he said. "It is temptation is not a penalty, but in the grip of being a man, and temptation comes from the most unsuspecting ways."

SUMMERSIDE — Two jail escapes, who had a short-lived freedom due to citizen and police cooperation, were caught Saturday morning after a side patrol of Summerside jail early Saturday morning. The pair, James MacDonald and Caschies Neil Sharp and Ronald Mallan, aged 19 and 21, were arrested by side patrol officers. MacDonald, Mr. MacLean, and Mr. MacLean had turned his car lights on the lot where he had seen the pair, but they apparently hid into the darkness. Seeing no sound around on arrival, the two police officers patrolled eastward a distance of about 100 yards when two men walking along the highway.

On questioning the pair they escapedes claimed to be postal pickers from the mainland but as the police officers were suspicious, they looked them over and charged and brought them back to Prince County jail where on arrival learned they were the two being sought. Escape was apparently made by sawing the bars and tearing of the mesh on an iron grill of the cell's window. RCMP are investigating the break.
