### NOTES BY THE WAY.

A TRIP abroad at this season will bring to mind one advantage resulting from our exhibitions which is not to be overlooked. We refer to the sales of stock that are effected by reason of the fact that those who have and those who haven't are brought together. Some men go to the exhibition to show their animals and get prizes; others come to it to see the show and the races,—and it not infrequently happens that the latter see and desire animals which the farmers have to sell. If the latter have money or credit at the bank, it is an easy matter to effect a sale and purchase. That this is frequently done is shown by the fact that the steamer Princess took across the water on Friday and Saturday last, besides the racers, no less than seventy-one horses which had been purchased by sight-seers at the exhibition. We have no doubt that sales of cattle, sheep, poultry and other things were also effected, and that these things, to the value of many thousands of dollars, were exported by way of Point du Chene as well as of Picton on the days immediately succeeding the Provincial exhibition.

The County exhibitions are productive of sales in a lesser degree; but all are more or less advantageous on this account. Our farmers ought, however, to be careful not to lightly give up, for the sake of a snug sum of money, animals which are valuable to them for breeding purposes. To do this is to act on the principle of killing the goose which lays the golden egg. There is a feeling abroad that the price of animals will advance. Horses are reported to be on the rise notwithstanding all the electric cars, bicycles, motors, etc., which are now on the market. It is the opinion of experienced breeders and far-seeing men, such as Mr. Johnson, of Ontario, that standard-bred and registered animals like those shown at our exhibitions, may, ere long, be obtained in Canada, instead of in England, for use in the Argentine Republic and throughout South America. We who are near the sea occupy a favorable position and ought to participate largely in such a trade. There is the possibility, too, of being able to send first-class cattle and sheep from Prince Edward Island to replenish the blood of animals bred in Ontario and Quebec as well as Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. It is certainly easier and cheaper for a breeder to come here to obtain a strain of blood that he may require than to go to England for it. Our farmers should resist tempting offers for stock which they may require for breeding purposes and which are worth to them and the Province far more than the money which animals will fetch. They should look to the future and to the building up of the character of P. E. Island stock.

It is very pleasing to note that the stout little steamer Princess is popular and likely to draw passenger traffic by way of Picton. The Steam Navigation Company are often accused of being too conservative in their methods. But they are to be credited with two up-to-date steamers which reflect great credit upon the Island Province. Their conservatism, too, has prompted the retention in their service of men of tried ability—men who have won the confidence of the travelling public and continuously retain it through storm and shine.

We have had a worse railway service than that which is now provided between Picton and Truro. But we might easily have a much better one. The cars are very good, though of course they are not the best quality of first-class. But the road bed is by no means smooth, after a year of Liberal rule; and the jolting of the train as it stops and starts and shunts and backs up reminds one of an accommodation train in P. E. Island when under control

of one of the most unskilful and careless of drivers.

Truro, it is pleasing to see, continues to thrive. A new feature to be noted is the building erected by the Merchant's Bank of Halifax. It occupies a prominent site on the principal street, and adds considerably to the businesslike aspect of this pretty central Nova Scotian town. Truro has long been highly favored in having a Sun of its own; and the many friends of Mr. W. B. Alley will be pleased to learn that he has lately added to his stock in trade one of the best steam presses in the Maritime Provinces—thus affording practical evidence of prosperity in the past and the assurance of prosperity in the future. The people of Truro, as a whole, show their taste and public spirit in their beautiful trees and flowers, their well kept lawns, smooth sidewalks and brightly colored houses. The colors are, to be sure, not always aesthetically blended, nor are the streets always smooth. But there exists in Truro so much evidence of a popular desire to improve and to be up with the times, that there is in it abundant hope for the future. Its park is certainly one of the most beautiful spots in all Canada, and the manner in which its beauties have been opened to the public by Mr. Ross and those who co-operate with him affords a striking example of the union of utility and good taste. It is worth while to stay in Truro for a day or two, if only to see its park.

### NOTES AND COMMENTS

—The Mail and Empire points out that Mr. Fielding can leave for England to negotiate the \$15,000,000 loan without fear of finding on his arrival a letter in the London Economist by Sir Richard Cartwright fiercely maligning Canada and Canadian credit.

### MANITOBA SCHOOL QUESTION.

Pope Leo XIII Said Not to Like the Settlement.

OTTAWA, Sept. 25.—The Free Press, the local organ of the Government, has the following with reference to the Manitoba school question: "One point is needed to make the Manitoba school question a dead issue. Until this is covered there may be an opening for more trouble and complaint. With its reputation would be removed the last semblance of grievance. Premier Greenway made a promise at the Laurier banquet in Montreal that the condition under which the new school law is administered in Manitoba would be made favorable to both classes of the community. This has not been done. This is no idle statement of speculation. It is a matter of fact and the reason why the Manitoba Government has not done what was promised through its premier does not appear. This statement gives color to the rumor which has been current here for a few days that the Government has received private information that the decision of the Pope, which will probably not be made public for some time yet, will be against the Government's contention that the settlement arrived at by Mr. Greenway and Mr. Sifton is satisfactory, and that the announced decision is being held back in the hope that Mr. Greenway will make further concessions. In this connection, another rumor which is current here may be mentioned, and that is that the decision of His Holiness will not be given until after the arrival in Rome of Bishop Bruchesi, who will sail from New York on the 9th of October to pay his first visit to the Pope since he became a bishop.

### NEWS NOTES.

Mrs. Flanagan, wife of Thos. Flanagan, proprietor of the Adams House, Chatham, died a few days ago.

More than half of the village of Newport Pagnell has been destroyed by fire. The flames consumed forty thatched cottages, with barns and outbuildings, and 150 people are made homeless.

A despatch from Rome announces that about forty persons have been killed, and that many others have been injured by an earth-quake at the sulphur mines near Girgenti.

Fire destroyed the Musee Theatre, Toronto; loss \$20,000, fully insured. During the fire horses attached to the fire engine ran away, killing a lad named E-cott and injuring a dozen or so firemen and citizens.

Typhoid fever is causing ravages among the Turkish troops in Thessaly. Six thousand men have already been invalidated home and four thousand others are awaiting transportation back to Turkey.

The Paris Figaro warns the Government that Germany is earnestly considering whether Europe should "allow the United States to drive Spain out of Cuba," and recalls the fact that the war of 1812 arose from mistakes made by French diplomacy in regard to Spain.

John Dillon, M. P., and other Irish members of the House of Commons have sent a memorial to Mr. Arthur Balfour requesting that parliament be summoned to meet immediately for the purpose of voting funds for the relief of the tenants in Ireland which the memorial alleges are threatened with famine and ruin, owing to the failure of the potato crop, weather-spoiled grain and general agricultural depression. The memorial asserts that a great majority of the tenants in Ireland will be ruined if they are compelled to pay full rents during the coming winter and that this will lead to agitation and disturbances.
