MacKinnon, both of the staff of the Provincial Sanatorium, winning a course of three months studying of surgical nursing technique and post-operative care at the Nova Scotia Sanatorium in Kentville, N. S.

A trip long to be remembered has just been completed by David W. Gallant of the Sea Cadet Corps Kent of this city. His visit, which started from Quebec aboard the Canadian cruiser H.M.C.S. Quebec, took him to Portsmouth, England, and eventually across the continent to Sweden where he attended a Sea Cadet camp outside Stockholm.

It was also arranged that the supervisors of the squares escort the children to the Prince Edward Theatre on the morning of Sept. 1st, Labour Day, to attend the opening session of the Canadian Legion, Prince Edward Island command of the B. E. S. L. As the services are interesting and impressive a good attendance is expected.

The Catholic Women's League Convention Mass at St. Dunstan's Basilica was celebrated at 8 a.m. yesterday by His Excellency Most Rev. James Boyle who also delivered an inspiring sermon. He commended the members in their choice of a convention theme, "Women's obligation to safeguard the sanctity of the home" and warned them against sins of omission. He stressed the virtue of purity as exemplified by St. Maria Goretti. The girls' choir was in attendance and sang several hymns.

Speaking at the annual meeting of the East Prince Liberal Association held in Summerside last evening, Premier J. Walter Jones referred to the present transportation problems that face this province. He said that "with the two ferries we now have, we cannot continue to get the ever increasing number of tourists to and from the province." He said that within a year or two the present transportation facilities will be far from adequate and he believed that the keel of a new boat should be laid, not some time in the future, but now.

Mr. James Waddell of Fredericton, N. B., who arrived in the City on Monday, expects to have the new Elgin street sweeper in operation today. The machine, which has been here since Saturday, was thoroughly overhauled by Mr. Waddell yesterday preparatory to demonstrating the working of the sweeper before handing it over to the city.

By the purchase of this sweeper at a cost of \$10,419.50, the Street Committee expects to effect a saving of \$13,000 yearly and give a much more effective service and a greater coverage.

In the party with His Excellency will be his secretary, Mr. Lionel Massey, accompanied by Mrs. Massey, and his aide-de-camp-in-waiting, Captain Nicholas Eden, the son of Britain's Foreign Secretary, Rt. Hon. Anthony Eden.
