Probationary Licenses Suggested For Drivers

SUMMERSIDE — Car drivers between ages of 18 and 25 may have to be careful on how they drive in the future.

Considered last night at the Summerside Board of Trade was the idea of issuing probationary licenses. It works like this: if involved in an accident, the driver loses the probationary licence for a period of three months. If it occurs again, the driver loses the licence for a longer period of six months. Each time the penalty is double that of the previous one.

Drivers above this age bracket will be licensed in the regular manner.

The meeting last night also agreed that Alex Campbell, secretary of the Summerside Board should try to arrange a meeting for a delegation with Hon. Phillip Matheson, minister of highways, next Monday, regarding the closing of the main highway between here and Albany.

At the same time an effort will be made to arrange talks with Hon. Leo Rossiter, minister of natural resources.

Board of trade members were notified that the main route through to Albany was officially closed last night, Tuesday, March 2.

The main factors, being at this time of year, were weather conditions and weight restrictions. Francis "Ginger" MacQuarrie, president, termed the matter as "very serious".

A better system of announcing to the public the arrivals of the car ferry Abegweit, was close to being decided.

"Some one should be in waiting rooms to inform the public on this and a ship to shore phone, were two suggestions offered as remedies for the ferry nuisance.

It was decided letters of inquiry would be mailed to George Rogers, director of transportation, Charlottetown, to the superintendent of railways, Charlottetown and to the shore captain, Borden.

Montague Plans Skating Rink

MONTAGUE — Plans for a new hockey and skating rink were discussed Tuesday when architect G. Keith Pickard visited the proposed site of the \$25,000 rink. Mr. Pickard was accompanied by Ralph Beck, chairman of the rink committee, Preston MacLure, community welfare league member and G. Arnold Whitman.

Although no decision has been reached on the type of building, it is expected that the architect will present further plans in the near future. Considerable interest has been shown by the residents of the town suggesting that the rink should have an artificial plant and not just the natural ice.

Public opinion shows that the rink should be constructed near the Langley Frosted Food plant in order to take advantage of their offer to make use of their freezing units.

The Commons adjourned ordinary business to debate the escape of Lucien Rivard, key figure in a judicial inquiry, from jail.

The motion to set aside the normal business was made by Opposition Leader Diefenbaker, who accused the government of carelessness.

Speaker Alan Macnaughton ruled it in order after opposition MPs kept interrupting Justice Minister Favreau.

They insisted Mr. Favreau talk only on the matter of urgency of debate, not give explanations about the escape.

Mr. Diefenbaker accused the government of showing solicitude for a "bug" and disregarding "public morality."

Mr. Favreau said Mr. Diefenbaker did not outline one federal responsibility in the escape but only made "insultations."

Marked Gas Use Brings \$100 Fine

SOURIS — A heavy docket faced Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Kings County Magistrate's court Wednesday.

Albert Augustus Whalen, Red Point, was fined \$100 when he pleaded guilty to a charge of using marked gas.

Joseph Howard Dunphy, Souris, charged with failing to report an accident, was fined \$50 and costs or 15 days. Counsel for the accused was M. J. MacQuaid.

Albert Joseph Campbell, Red Point, pleaded guilty to a charge of damaging property and was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days. He was ordered to make restitution which amounted to \$47.25 by Magistrate Johnston.

William Sutherland Carter of Souris had a charge of assault withdrawn. Sutherland was accused of assaulting a department of fisheries officer.

Charged with possession of a "still", Grover Lawrence Smith of Annandale pleaded not guilty and had his case adjourned to March 17 in Souris.

primarily the task of the federal government set down for them by the provisions of the BNA Act," he stated.

PATRONAGE CHARGES
Referring to charges of political patronage in the civil service commission made earlier by George Ferguson (L-5th Kings), Mr. Matheson said "I know of not one single instance in my department where we did not adhere strictly to the rules."

He said he noted the member had not retracted his charges nor made a further statement about the matter in the Legislature.

"We will all be waiting to hear more on this serious matter," he concluded.

The minister said work was progressing favorably on the new provincial government offices building, with target date for completion set at Dec. 31.

HIGHWAY SAFETY
Referring to highway safety, Mr. Matheson said "safety is the first consideration in the planning of highways and in the reason for most of our highway standards."

He said uses of the highways are changing and some of these changes are making it difficult for us to provide safe driving conditions, particularly in winter."

He said the pattern of winter driving is changing. "Commuting to work," he said, "is becoming part of our way of life. He added that the many school buses now in operation require immediate road openings for children. This is a tall order, particularly during the frequent storms."

The minister said that the habit of parking vehicles on the highway in winter is a problem. "It is not always easy to get a vehicle off the highway in winter," he said, "but every vehicle parked on the road is a potential accident hazard and slows up plowing operations. The practice makes it impossible for plows to widen roads. The provincial safety council and I are more drastic action will be needed if the practice continues."

Mr. Matheson said his department is thinking of using compact snow blowers with a good snow throwing capacity to clear snow from gateways. Then the property owner should experience little difficulty in getting his vehicle off the road."

WINTER TOLL
The minister said that in spite of the fact that more vehicles are using Island highways than ever before in winter, the winter accident fatality rate is "small in number, compared to summer."

Referring to spending by his department last year, Mr. Matheson said \$925,000 on general highway construction; \$300,000 on bridges; \$1,600,000 on provincial paving; \$400,000 on pavement maintenance and \$100,000 on signs and markings.

He added that \$1,600,000 was spent on the Trans Canada Highway but the federal government pays 90 per cent of this cost, and \$1,775,000 was spent in the Roads to Resources program and 90 per cent of this is paid by Ottawa.

New Bank For S'side Tender Let

SUMMERSIDE — It was announced yesterday that a contract for the erection of a new building to house the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce here, has been awarded to Williams, Murphy and MacLeod Ltd.

The manager of the bank, Bruce MacDougall, stated that the present building will be demolished beginning March 15 and the bank will be relocated in the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeder's Association building.

The association building has been renovated and equipped for banking purposes and the staff will move during the week-end prior to March 15.

The new building, of brick, steel and granite construction, will be larger than the present one, measuring 78 by 45 feet. It will consist of one floor, with mezzanine. Construction is expected to take approximately six months.
