

### British Army League Looks At Canadian Forces Plans

LONDON (CP) — Britain's Army League, taking a close look at Canada's military integration plan, says integration can be a good servant and "a dangerous master".

In a newly published pamphlet outlining what it considers to be Britain's army needs, the organization of veterans headed by Gen. Sir Richard Gale suggests "integration is valuable when it can be made to serve a common end but there is nothing to recommend integration for integration's sake."

Sir Richard, former deputy supreme allied commander in Europe, concludes the time is ripe for a single organization to handle the administrative requirements and other non-combat segments of Britain's three armed services.

But despite the official Canadian argument in favor of total integration, the league's chairman maintains there is a strong case, including "the powerful nuclear war, the more opportunity to revive old rivalries and antagonisms."

Sir Richard acknowledges Britain also benefits from the military strength of its allies, including Canada, the U.S. and other countries.

### Dairy Industry Gets Views Of Consumers

MURRAY BAY, Que. (CP) — Mrs. A. F. W. Plumtree, national president of the Consumers' Association of Canada, told the National Dairy Council convention here the industry should stress more effective bacteriological control.

"It is not reassuring for consumers to read reports of large seizures of cheese as unfit for human consumption," she told delegates representing milk product manufacturers.

Mrs. Plumtree said technological and scientific changes in the food industry could bring about health hazards such as "foreign matter in cheese and rancidity in butter."

The consumer's association wanted to know what research on dairy products was carried out before vacuum packaged cheese was put on the market.

"For example, what causes the slimy condition of some cheese in these packages? Are the white spots often seen in cheese in these packages due to the vacuum?"

**SERVING SKIMPY**  
Mrs. Plumtree suggested but

ter makers get together with the restaurant industry to create the size of servings and the packaging of butter in restaurants. She said butter servings were 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 times as large in Europe as in Canada.

G. M. Strudwick, president of the Dairy Farmers of Canada representing 300,000 milk producers, said present government price support levels are inadequate.

Industry spokesman Philip Pariseau said federal assistance to the dairy industry is needed because a steady decline for dairy products all year around still leaves producers with a surplus at peak production periods.

### Posters of Lenin And Cosmonauts Seem Out Of Pace In Samarkand

SAMARKAND (CP) — Lenin and the cosmonauts have a rough time competing for attention in this ancient city with a name that conjures up visions of Arabian knights and oriental bazaars.

Statuses and portraits of the father of revolutionary Russia are duly spotted here and there as in any Soviet city, and helmeted Gagarins and Tjovs contemplate the heavens from the tops of public billboards.

But somehow they seem out of place in Samarkand, second city of the Soviet republic of Uzbekistan. For Samarkand still belongs in spirit to Tamerlane, who made the capital of a mighty Asiatic empire in the 14th and early 15th centuries.

The mayor, Raktam Jumlatov, likes to dwell on modern statistics—Samarkand has 250,000 people; this year it's building 15,000 new apartments; it has 17 industries including one making tractors, another making cinema equipment and a third turning out super-phonographs for agriculture; and it has in recent years become an important scientific research centre.

**STRESS THE PAST**  
But when it comes time for tightening the chains on the English-speaking guide will concentrate on the antiquities, especially those relating to Tamerlane, who was born no far away and who lies buried here.

### New Moderator Sees No Objection To Union

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Dr. Ernest Howse had been moderator of the United Church of Canada a less than an hour when he took the place of the post moderator Dr. J. R. Mutch.

Dr. Howse, of Toronto, said he would have no objection to union with Anglican Church of Canada. Less than an hour earlier, Dr. Mutchmor, in his farewell address, said he had "very limited regard for an episcopally-governed church."

"We've had very great religious fevers in recent history," Dr. Howse said, "but most of them have been of the Anglican communion." He said the possibility of such a union is not great at this time but the Anglican Church has been a leader in many direct moves toward amalgamation with both the Roman Catholic and the Protestant churches.

"I wouldn't see any objection to having a bishop in such a United Church," he said. "I was born a Methodist and there are Methodist bishops."

He jokingly suggested another reason such a union may be possible was the fact that "my cousin is married to an Anglican bishop of Newfoundland."

### S. Rhodesia Plebiscite Is Indicated

### Anti-Dumping Law Changes Are Urged

LONDON (CP) — Edward Heath, British prime minister, called on Canada to modify its anti-dumping laws on imports from the United Kingdom.

He hopes that the Canadian government will be able to find a way of helping us on this as soon as possible. Heath said in a luncheon speech before the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in Great Britain.

In urging some modifications on the part of Canada's import policy, Heath, a cabinet minister, advocated a broad, multilateral concept of world trade for the Commonwealth, rather than mere concentration on special concessions within the Commonwealth family.

Attempts to increase Commonwealth tariff preferences, he said, "are impracticable."

"Neither Britain nor overseas Commonwealth countries would profit from such attempts to narrow the flow of trade."

Faced with the prospect that Britain's export drive may sag in this year and that the British international payments deficit may be heavy, Heath said the Conservative government is determined to keep the trade channels open.

While trade within the Commonwealth was a great source of strength and prosperity, "we are not and cannot be a self-contained trading group."

In touching on Canada's anti-dumping policies, Heath had in mind the complaints of British industry that they could sell more to Canada if Canada would ease restrictions on imports.

The Canadian anti-dumping laws are designed to protect Canadian industry against low-priced competing imports, if the import product comes in at what is considered less than its prevailing price in the home market. The Canadian government can impose an extra duty to increase the price of the import.

British industry has complained that the Canadian government is not automatically slips on the anti-dumping duty on low-priced imports.

### TYPHON KILLS EIGHT
