Former Bank Manager Dies

A former manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Charlottetown, Henry Wilson Binning, died at his home in Annapolis Royal, Oct. 1. He had been ill for a long period of time.

He was born in Saint John, N.B., a son of the late Alexander and Jane (Wilson) Binning. He was educated in Saint John, and entered the Bank of Nova Scotia in that city, and held memberships in the Bank of Nova Scotia in Windsor, N.S., Charlottetown, P.E.I. and Montreal, P.Q. He retired in 1924 and has since resided in Annapolis Royal.

He is survived by one sister, Miss Madge Binning, of Annapolis Royal.

Mr. Binning was a great reader and possessed a fine library. He was a Presbyterian by faith, very devoted to children, and a most beloved figure walking on the street with his cane and his dog John.

The funeral was held from the United Church of St. George and St. Andrew and service was conducted by the Rev. G. M. Baxter. Interment was in Woodlawn Cemetery, Annapolis. Former agriculture minister

Time Changes Saturday

Daylight Saving time ends Saturday in most provinces of Canada and this province will slip back to Standard Time from its six-month experiment with "advanced" summer hours.

Premier Walter R. Shaw, whose government took the lead by opening and closing its offices an hour earlier, said yesterday that "the system of time in this province for the past six months seemed satisfactory to all."

Asked if his government was planning to implement a form of daylight saving time officially next year, the premier said "there doesn't seem to be any need; the present system works very well."

The decision they must make is one of possible far-reaching consequence, with authorities agreeing it will have a direct bearing on future town planning, as well as on supplying the immediate municipal needs of the people of the area.

It was formerly a part of the Spring Park school district, but was not included when that village decided to join the city last year.

As a result, it created a situation whereby residents belonging to no school district, and children of school age were left in a position of having no school to attend. This was temporarily overcome by sending their children to schools in Charlottetown with the provincial government paying the cost.

However, earlier this year the government announced it would no longer take over this expense and residents would have to bear it, themselves.

But an amendment to the Municipal Act which is a duty responsible for educating the children of the area, it also makes the district liable to city taxation for this purpose.

The situation is further complicated by several factors. One is the recent development there of a co-operative housing unit with a number of families, the majority of whom have children of school age. Another factor is that these families, despite being home owners, have not resided in the district long enough to be eligible to vote in the plebiscite.

A third factor was mentioned yesterday when it was pointed out that the city School Board has taxing authority to assess taxes to cover the cost of educating their children—and that tax could be assessed against all taxpayers in the area, not simply against parents of the children of school age.

Since the cost of educating each child in city schools is stated to be in excess of \$100 per year, it has been noted that the strong possibility exists that the so-called "frozen assets" of the city would probably be slightly less than the amount of the tax which would be levied by the school board.

In favor of amalgamation, one has suggested that residents of "No Man's Land" look to the great development, particularly along Massena street, which has taken place since the Village of Spring Park voted to become part of the city. He also said people would be getting certain civic services immediately, with others to follow. He mentioned these included city water, as well as police and fire protection.

Questioned on the matter yesterday, Mr. Jenkins said: "We have made an effort to influence the voters, and I believe the lesson learned from the amalgamation of Spring Park is plain to be seen. I personally hope the people will come into the city, so that they may share in the continued progress and development of the whole community."

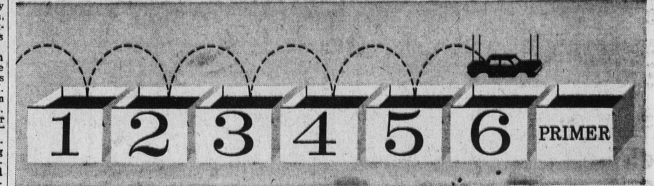
