

Accent Is Seen On Youth Among 42 Candidate Stars

BY THE CANADIAN PRESS
The accent was on youth among the 42 candidates who started in Monday's federal election by winning seats held by other political parties in the last Parliament.

Among the anti-killers was Rev. David Macdonald, 29-year-old United Church minister who defeated Minister J. Watson MacNaught in Prince, in eastern Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Macdonald, native of Charlottetown, was the first clergyman ever to run for federal or provincial office on the island. Mr. MacNaught was one of two cabinet ministers defeated.

NOVA SCOTIA
D. Hugh Gillis, 47, doctor of economics and political science who spent another political election, Liberal John B. Stewart in Antigonish-Guysborough.

Robert McCleave, 43, lawyer and broadcaster who won one of the two Halifax seats in 1958 and 1962 for the Conservatives and was parliamentary secretary to the public works minister before defeat in 1963.

Michael "reynold", 33, Mr. McCleave's Conservative running-mate in Halifax, like him a former newspaper man who recently has been manager of a Halifax aviation firm.

John Bower, 64, retired oil company executive, PC victor over Liberal Fred T. Armstrong in Shelburne-Yarmouth-Clare.

QUEBEC
Roger Roussin, 44, father of six and director of an industrial relations firm who ousted Liberal Vincent Drouin in Argenouil-Deux-Montagnes.

Jean-Paul Racine, 37, former mayor of St. Honore and Liberal MP 1958-1962. He defeated Creditiste Gerard Perron in Beauce.

Antoine Yanakis, 43, industrialist who ran twice successfully for the provincial legislature and scored this time as a Liberal in Berthier - Maskinonge-Delaunoyere, a Conservative seat in 1963.

Martial Asselin, 41, lawyer who served a 1958-62 term in the Commons and briefly in 1963 was minister without portfolio in the Diefenbaker cabinet. He won Charlevoix from the Creditistes.

Paul Langlois, 39, manager of a Chicoutimi manufacturing plant and Liberal winner in Chicoutimi, formerly held by Social Credit's Maurice Cole.

Gustave Cole, 52, Liberal, a plastics engineer who took Dorchester from the Creditistes. Russell Keays, 52, onetime mayor of Gaspé and former MP for Ile-de-la-Madeleine: Conservative winner in Gaspé over Liberal Alexandre Cyr.

J.-Roland Comtois, 38, company director now Liberal MP for Joliette - l'Assomption-Montcalm, formerly Conservative.

Gaston Clermont, 52, secretary-treasurer of the town of Thurso, former Liberal victor in two elections who staged a successful comeback over Social Credit in Labelle.

Alcide Bissard, standing for Parliament for the first time, made one of the only two gains for the Creditistes by winning Lac St. Jean from Marcel Lesard, 39, a Social Credit MP in the last Parliament who turned independent.

Tom Lefebvre, 39, service station manager and town councillor in Temiskaming: Liberal victor in Pontiac - Temiskamingue over former Conservative minister Paul Martineau.

Roland Godin, standing as a Creditiste won the Portneuf seat held by Jean-Louis Frenette, 44, an architectural draftsman elected as a Social in 1962 and again in 1963, but standing on this occasion as an independent.

Gerard Duquet, 56, sales manager, former executive of the Quebec Liberal Federation, who defeated Creditiste Robert Beaulieu in Quebec East.

Ovide Laffamme, 48, lawyer with two previous terms in the Commons; Liberal winner this time in Quebec Montmorency. Guy Marcoux of Social Credit.

Jean Marchand, 47, ex-president of the Confederation of National Trade Unions, bright hope of the Liberal new guard in Quebec West over Lucien Plourde, Creditiste.

Guy Leblanc, 44, land surveyor and forester, who scored a Liberal landslide in Rimouski over Gerard, Ouellet who was elected as a Social Credit candidate in 1963 but ran as a Conservative this time.

Paul Beaulieu, 63, minister of industry in the Duplessis provincial government: Conservative victor by a walkaway in St. Jean - Iberville-Napierville, seat of Yvon Dupuis who had to resign as Liberal minister without portfolio.

Paul O. Trepanier, 48, architect, mayor of Granby since 1964; PC winner over Creditiste Gilbert Roudanet in Shefford, by a whisker.

Maurice Allard, 43, a lawyer and anti-Diefenbaker former PC member (1958-62) standing as independent: PC defeated Gerard Chapdelaine, a Social Credit member in last Parliament, but running as an independent in this election. In Sherbrooke, Mr. Chapdelaine was one of seven SC members who stayed faithful to party leader Robert Thompson in the 1963 party split, but he later defected.

Former mayor of Trois-Rivieres J. A. Monroin, an ex-Liberal, standing as an independent, took the Trois-Rivieres seat held in last Parliament by former deputy SC leader Leon Balcer, who broke with the party over Mr. Diefenbaker's leadership. Mr. Balcer did not stand in this election.
