### Crop Damage Said 'Heavy'

Frost damage to P.E.I. tobacco fields, even greater than had been feared at first, it was learned yesterday from David Peacock, provincial department of agriculture. Chilling of some leaves that was not apparent to the eye in the field is showing up in the curing, Mr. Peacock explained.

So far as could be learned yesterday, practically every field in the province has been affected, although one or two growers like Merle Rogerson, Panningbrook and Leigh O'Brien, Alberton, are said to have escaped with comparatively light damage.

Leaves that are chilled, it is explained, turn black under the heat in the curing kilns, instead of yellowing, as is desired, and tobacco producers must go through the extra work of separating the spoiled leaves from the good after the tobacco is cured.
