Huge Boost Is Noted In Gov't Tax Revenue

OTTAWA (CP) - The high-sounding buoyancy of the economy, together with its taste for imports, is selling government coffers with an almost embarrassing increase in tax revenues.
 Total tax revenues in the first half of the current fiscal year are up seven per cent from the same period last year. But sales tax revenues are running more than 15 per cent greater and customs revenues nearly nine per cent.
 The period covered by the latest available figures is the six months from April 1 to Sept. 30. The last six months of the fiscal year running to next March 31 will show the full effect of income tax reductions which became effective at July 1.
 Former finance minister Gordon estimated in his budget speech to Parliament last spring that sales tax revenues this fiscal year would increase by \$99,000,000 to \$1,303,000,000 from \$1,204,000,000. This is an increase of eight per cent.
REVENUE HIGH
 But sales tax revenues for the first half of this fiscal year amounted to \$659,900,000, compared with \$570,100,000 last year. An increase of 15.7 per cent. The increase is even more dramatic in the sales tax receipts of the Old Age Security Fund. That fund, from which universal old age pensions of \$75 a month now are paid to everyone 70 and older, receives three percentage points of the 11-per cent sales tax. Receipts from April through September this year amounted to \$246,300,000, up 26 per cent from last fiscal year's mid-year receipts of \$181,000,000.
 Total receipts of the Old Age Security Fund in six months this year were \$563,500,000, compared with \$454,500,000 last year, an increase of 24 per cent. Starting next Jan. 1, however, the fund will have to bear the additional cost of \$75 monthly pensions to everyone at age 65, instead of 70. The qualifying age is being lowered year-by-year until it reaches 65.
 Sales tax collections represent about 17 per cent of total tax revenues and about 44 per cent of Old Age Security fund revenues.
EXPECTED INCREASE
 Customs import duties, on the other hand, do not contribute to the old age fund but normally account for about nine per cent

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Aluminum Sale Is Agreed On

WASHINGTON (AP) - The U.S. government and the major American producers reached a general agreement Tuesday on the disposal of the government's 1,400,000 tons of surplus aluminum, the defence department announced.
 The agreement ultimately will involve an estimated \$700,000,000 worth of aluminum, on the basis of current market prices, a spokesman said.
 The defence department announced that the industry representatives and the government representatives agree in principle that the industry will purchase the surplus aluminum at an average rate of not less than 100,000 tons per year or the defence requirement, whichever is greater, but not to exceed 200,000 tons per year, except that in 1966 the minimum quantity to be purchased will be not less than 150,000 tons.
 "The defence requirement for 1966 is estimated to range between 300,000 and 400,000 tons."

Robb Co. Plans New Warehouse

MONTREAL (CP) - Robb Engineering Works Ltd., a subsidiary of Dominion Bridge Co. Ltd. of Montreal, Tuesday announced plans for a \$500,000 warehouse at Halifax.
 The company expects to open the new facilities April 1, 1966, after installing modern handling facilities and machinery for cutting and burning steel in a 14,000-square-foot leased building.

Key Declarations Clear Vatican Council Hurdles

VATICAN CITY (AP) - Key declarations on birth control, racial discrimination and atheism cleared major hurdles at the Vatican Ecumenical Council Tuesday.
 In a series of votes as they rushed to wind up work on their controversial agenda on modern world problems, the Roman Catholic council fathers meeting in St. Peter's Basilica:
 - Approved a statement on birth control that stresses conjugal love in marriage as an element important not only for bringing children into the world but as a physical expression of mutual love between husband and wife.
 Council experts said it incorporates views of Paul-Emile Cardinal Leger of Montreal.
 - Quashed an 11-hour conservative demand to include an open condemnation of communism in its approved text on atheism. The text calls for a dialogue between the Roman Catholic Church and all non-believers and singles out neither Marxism nor communism by name.
EXPAND LOVE IDEA
 The part of the birth control statement emphasizing conjugal love has been considerably expanded from an earlier version.
 Last year and during this council session Cardinal Leger spoke out for a new view of marriage to accept the idea that physical love is an essential marital element, by which couples express their love and respect for each other.
 Many theologians regard this concept as pointing the way to acceptance in the Roman Catholic Church of the idea that sex in itself is a fundamental good in marriage.
 Some of them feel that recognition of this view could one day provide the basis of the moral acceptability of contraception.
 Panel experts said that should the statement promised by Pope Paul on the issue bring changes in the rules, those changes would become a new part of church teaching and the council's statements would still apply.
 They said the document was worded in a way to provide for any major changes in the future on the church attitude toward contraception.

Russian Plans In Expo 67 Cause Some Astonishment

MOSCOW (CP) - Russia has jumped with both feet into planning for Expo 67, the Montreal world's fair, to the jubilation of all its organizers and the astonishment of some.
 The depth of the Soviet commitment for the 1967 exhibition became evident Tuesday as a conclusion of two days of talks here between the exhibition delegation headed by Commissioner-General Pierre Dupuy and representatives of 10 countries invited to participate in a theme pavilion.
 Dupuy told a press conference he expects Russia to make a large contribution to the pavilion, dedicated to the theme Man The Explorer. It is one of five special pavilions planned for the fair within the general theme Man and His Universe.
 Participating countries will contribute to them in addition to maintaining their own national pavilions.
 Dupuy expressed optimism that all 10 countries represented here will contribute to the particular pavilion under discussion, including the United States, Britain and France.
 But it was evident that world's fair officials were especially delighted by the interest shown by Russia, which conference sources said seemed to take the lead in drumming up responses from the other countries.
 The Russians were particularly interested in the exhibit Man in Polar Regions, a subdivision of the exploration exhibit. No fewer than 29 Soviet experts were on hand for discussion of this subject.
 The discussion was presided over by B. A. Borisov, commissioner of the Soviet entry in the fair. Russian stenographers took minutes of the meeting and these immediately were typed up and circulated to the Soviet Academy of Sciences and other government agencies that might become involved in the Soviet exhibit.
 Russia's own contribution is expected to centre around development of Arctic towns and construction in the permafrost zone. Weather and oceanographic research may also be depicted.
 Dupuy, at the press conference, professed not to be surprised at Russia's unqualified response to the theme pavilion idea. But other Expo officials expressed elated astonishment at the extent of the Soviet commitment.

Doctor Shortage Seen For Quebec

MONTREAL (CP) - Quebec will have a shortage of 2,500 doctors within 20 years unless the provincial government urgently takes steps to establish a fifth school of medicine, the Quebec College of Physicians and Surgeons said in a statement Tuesday.
 The college said that in 1961 there were 143 physicians for every 100,000 persons in the United States and 140 in Ontario compared with 121 in Quebec.
 The college said Quebec should seek a ratio of 140 per 100,000.
 However, the statement said, "If our universities cannot train more students than at the moment, our medical population by 1986 will only be 10,500 physicians when our need will be for 13,000."
 The necessary personnel, together with the required funds, should be provided to our existing facilities to graduate an additional 800 physicians in the next 20-year period. The necessary remains to establish a fifth school of medicine which could graduate an additional 900 physicians.

Industrial Bank Loans Increase

OTTAWA (CP) - The Industrial Development Bank had loans and investments with an asset value of \$257,301,212 at the end of last month, compared with \$255,145,386 at the end of September, the bank reported Tuesday.
 The bank, established in 1946, helps small and medium-size businesses to obtain financing not otherwise available on reasonable terms and conditions.
 Its loans outstanding at the end of June this year were \$250,300,000, up 16 per cent from \$215,900,000 at the end of June last year.
