MAGNIFICENT PROGRAM ARRANGED FOR AIRFORCE DAY AT SUMMERSIDE

Tomorrow R. C. A. F. Station Summerside opens its gates to Island residents as the Royal Canadian Air Force in Canada and Europe celebrates its 8th annual Air Force Day.

The day was inaugurated in 1947 so that the citizens of Canada would have the opportunity of seeing for themselves the equipment and personnel of Canada's Airforce. Millions of Canadians have visited their local airbases and the day has come to be something looked forward to from year to year by all within driving distance of an R.C.A.F. station.

Last Airforce Day, 19th September, 1953, was postponed from the usual June date due to the Coronation of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, nevertheless, R.C.A.F. station Summerside had a record attendance when the Air Navigation School provided the main theme for both air and ground displays.

Since last fall the function of the local base has changed from that of a school for the training of basic navigators to that of an operational training unit which specializes in the training of the aircrews who man the Maritime reconnaissance aircraft of Maritime Air Command. Consequently, the theme of this year's displays will be distinctly Maritime.

Television Station

Of particular interest is the operation of a television station during the big show. A television camera, transmitter and receiver on loan from the R.C.A.F. Radar and Communications School at Clinton, Ontario, will give the Airforce the opportunity of operating the first TV station in P.E.I. while the quality of TV does not come up to the present day commercial standards the exhibit promises to be one of interest. In addition, the telecommunications section has many other operating devices which should mystify as well as prove the ever-increasing importance of radio and radar in the modern air force.

Mr. Ross Armstrong, officer in charge of Summerside meteorological section, and his staff are busy constructing a thunder cloud, complete with lightning. The high cloud will form an appropriate background for the weatherman's display which is a perennial favorite with visitors to the show. Incidentally, Ross, with a typical weatherman's evasiveness states that the weather on Saturday should be warm "with only slight possibility of rain."

Even so he pointed out that over the years the temperature for June 13th has varied from a maximum of 83 degrees (F) to a minimum of 33 degrees (F).

Parachute Jump

The odds are that the sun will shine, and rain, if any, will be of the showery type. Light winds should prevail which should favor the parachute jumper who will be featured during the air show. Aircraft armament which will be shown for the first time at a Summerside Airforce Day will include an exhibit of bombs ranging in size from 11 lb. 2 pound practice bomb to the four thousand pound "cookies" used so effectively during the last war. Machine guns, cannon and gun turrets will also be included in the armament display.

While some Island men are being accepted for work in the woods in Nova Scotia and in New Brunswick, more than 500 persons are still registered as unemployed in Prince County alone, which is more than double that of last year at this same time.

The unemployment situation is more pronounced in rural areas, and an inquiry at the local office of the unemployment insurance commission revealed that the surplus of farm labor has disappeared, and for the first time in several years they have no requests on file for farm labourers.

In the past the situation was entirely different as they were usually looking for more men than could be found to work on farms. This spring there does not seem to be the usual amount of construction in Prince County and employment in general is slower than usual; part of this however, may be attributed to weather conditions.

As far as is known, no more calls for men are expected from Labrador this spring, and the main source of available employment at the present time, in terms of numbers, is the work in the woods in N.S. and N.B.

Unemployment In Prince County

While some Island men are being accepted for work in the woods in Nova Scotia and in New Brunswick, more than 500 persons are still registered as unemployed in Prince County alone, which is more than double that of last year at this same time.

The unemployment situation is more pronounced in rural areas, and an inquiry at the local office of the unemployment insurance commission revealed that the surplus of farm labor has disappeared, and for the first time in several years they have no requests on file for farm labourers.

In the past the situation was entirely different as they were usually looking for more men than could be found to work on farms. This spring there does not seem to be the usual amount of construction in Prince County and employment in general is slower than usual; part of this however, may be attributed to weather conditions.

As far as is known, no more calls for men are expected from Labrador this spring, and the main source of available employment at the present time, in terms of numbers, is the work in the woods in N.S. and N.B.
