Freak Rainstorm Causes Damage

The freak storm, amounting to a miniature cloudburst which passed around the outskirts of the city from Bunbury, via the golf links and westward to the lower Malpeque Road yesterday morning, brought on many of the roads and brought grief to farmers who had fields flooded. In several places the recently planted seed and even fertilizer, was washed away, necessitating re-planting at considerable loss of time and material. The unusual rush of water caused by the heavy rain made the north end of the lower Malpeque Road one huge gully which overran the embankment at Gates' mill, filling the pond to the extent that the wastage was carried away. Government men were engaged during the late afternoon repairing the highway bridge, which had also been badly damaged. By evening traffic was moving cautiously over the flooded area. Work of restoring the wastage is being done under the supervision of Mr. Fred Gates, on whose property the pond and mill are located.

Life Underwriters Hold Successful Conference

International leaders in the field of life insurance brought inspiring and educational addresses to a large gathering of Island Life Insurance salesmen yesterday, at one day conference held in the City Council Chambers. Mr. Victor Ling, C.L.U. was the conference chairman and presided at the morning session, while Mr. H. H. Gallant, C.L.U. was chairman of the afternoon meeting. The Association's Provincial President, Roy MacGillivray presided at the noon luncheon held at the Charlottetown Hotel at which Mayor J.D. Stewart conveyed the greetings of the City Council and lauded the life insurance men for their fine job they were doing in protecting families against the emergencies of sickness and death. The principal leaders at the meeting were Messrs David B. Fluergelman, C.L.U. of New York; A. Howard Moffatt, of Toronto; Jules Devore, C.L.U. of Montreal, Leslie W. Dunstall, of Toronto and Lawrence W. Hall, C. L. U. of Fredericton, N. B. Mr. Fluergelman spoke of "Life Insurance in Business", emphasizing the market which is open for this type of protection, and challenged the underwriters to conduct themselves as to justify public recognition, in giving a professional type of service. Mr. Moffatt spoke of "Cash Credit and Career". He warned newcomers to the business that success cannot be achieved overnight, but can only be achieved "through conscientious hard work". Mr. Devore stated the most recent figures available for life insurance in force in 21 countries, shows Canada leading the world in ratio of ownership of national income. Mr. Dunstall pointed out that there had been a tremendous improvement of the quality of service rendered by life underwriters to the public, which had developed an increased measure of respect and confidence, in recognition of the professional character of the work in which the life underwriter is engaged. An interesting incident at the noon luncheon meeting was a presentation to Mr. G. M. Black, C.L.U. on the eve of his retirement from active service with the Mutual Life. The presentation was made by Mr. R. J. Rupert, C.L.U. who recounted some of the many contributions Mr. Black had made to the work of the Association, having served in every office and had been an indefatigable worker for many years. In addition to this Mr. Black found time to interest himself in church and community work and was a citizen of which Charlottetown could be proud. Mr. Black repeated fittingly in a reminiscent vein. Huge House Trailer Causes Comment In City

Residents of Charlottetown yesterday stared with awe at a most unusual newcomer to Island life. It was the largest house trailer ever carried on the car deck of the ferry Abegweit and caused some consternation when officials found it was almost too big to be turned around. However after a few minutes of backing and juggling the trailer was in position facing the opposite direction from which it entered. This 27 1-2 foot three-room McGinness house trailer was brought from Peterborough, Ont. to Charlottetown by Mr. Paul Sharpe and the trip took just two days of actual driving, according to Mr. Sharpe who quite uneventfully. But the Guardian learned that this "uneventful" trip by way of Ottawa, Montreal, Quebec, Mont Tremblant and the famed Restigouche Mountain and Valley Trail and thence through Campbellton, Dalhousie the Chatham ferry and the Abegweit did contain some rather remarkable events. For one thing, Paul Sharpe is more noted as a pilot and had never drawn even a small trailer, let alone one of the size manufactured today. Yet he successfully navigated his way through the congested streets of the largest city in the country, along the most travelled highway in the country and through some of the roughest, winding roads and mountainous trails in Eastern C.N.A. One incident, however, Mr. Sharpe recalls with a bit of chagrin, for in Dalhousie, N.B. his record trip without incident was marred by being stalled just 30 feet from the top of the famous steepest hill on the whole trip. However, a jeep was called into service and with its aid the large trailer was easily pulled over the top and rolled easily all the rest of the way to Charlottetown. Most of the trip was done at a steady speed of from 45 to 60 miles per hour, at which speed Mr. Sharpe said the trailer rolled along most easily. He further mentioned that for the first fifty miles or so he was rather awed by the object behind the car, but after that he would admit to being a little nervous. After the thousand miles or so that were covered on this trip, he is prepared to go almost anywhere. The trailer itself is a McGinness, manufactured in Peterborough and is most amazingly complete in its furnishings. At one end is a spacious bedroom, complete with vanity and three closets. In the centre is a dinette that for the evening folds into a bed, sleeping two, and a kitchen that would be a dream for any lady. It is complete with a combination ice-electric refrigerator, propane gas cooking stove, electric hot water heater and counter sunk sink and tile background. There is a flush toilet with tiled walls. At the other end is the living room with a davenport that in the evening folds out to bring the sleeping accommodations to six. All members of the staff of the Guardian who had the opportunity of seeing this masterpiece in modern living during these periods of housing shortage would offer such a luxurious and complete choice of living. It is finished in birch and burning heater with forced draft circulation and inch and a half fiber glass insulation, this home on wheels could be used for year-round living.

Geographical Scholarships

OTTAWA, June 10 - Six university students, one from Manitoba, one from New Brunswick, two from Ontario, and two from England, have won the 1952 Geographical Scholarship awards of The Canadian Geographical Society. Gordon M. Dalrymple, executive secretary of the Society announced names of the successful candidates, selected from a group of twenty-two applicants, are as follows: John R. Main, Winnipeg; R. Spenser Inch, Hampstead, N.B.; G. Smith, Toronto; Keith G. Bain, Hamilton; Eric L. Brown, London, England; and Barbara L. Fenton, Tunbridge Wells, England. The awards, valued at \$250.00 each, are made by the Society as part of its activities in encouraging academic work in the geographical field. The awards were made this year to students rather than to institutions and were increased in number and in scope in keeping with the national character of the Society itself. One of the provisions of the awards, Mr. Dalrymple said, is that the successful candidate will be permitted to study at Canadian Universities of their own choosing.
