Whim Road and Vicinity

Mr. James MacLeod, bus driver, is enjoying several days holiday at his home at Whim Road, due to cancellation of bus service caused by road conditions.

Mrs. Farmer (formerly Miss Jean Stewart, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Stewart, Kilmuir) and son, are now in the Aleutians, where her husband, Lieut. Farmer is stationed. He is a flight officer on the route between Anchorage and the Aleutians.

It will be of interest to many in this vicinity to learn of some of its former residents who are at present in Northern Canada or Alaska. Mrs. Louis Watson, (formerly Miss Christine MacDonald, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman MacDonald, Whim Road) is now in Alaska, in the Northern part of the North West Territory near Yukon, where Mr. Weston is an officer in the R. C. M. F.

Lieut. Katherine MacDonald, A. F. N. C. (formerly of Kilmuir), has been stationed at the School of Aviation Medicine in Texas, and has been temporarily assigned to "the Alaska-Adak run", as flight nurse with the Medical Air Evac. Unit. She made several flights from U. S. to Alaska during February and March. The following quotations are taken from a letter received by her sister, Miss Anne MacDonald of Kilmuir. "My previous flight on the 16th. from Great Falls, Montana, was rather tiresome as I made the re-

turn flight on the 17th and 18th with only six hours sack time. We stopped at Fort Nelson, Whitehorse, Fairbanks and Anchorage, to pick up patients and unloaded at McChord, Washington and Great Falls. This time I arrived here early Friday morning and I'm to take the flight to Adak tomorrow morning (Sunday) and back Tuesday. Then the following Friday we return to the U. S. by way of McChord. The flight up was nearly as cold as the one last week. Yesterday I went into Anchorage (about ten miles by bus) and saw some of the "Alaska Day" celebrations, chiefly dog-team races.

"The teams race 25 miles each for four days. They make 25 miles in less than two hours. I think the drivers looked more tired than the dogs at the end of the race, as he stands up on the back of a light sleigh that looks like a snow shoe on runners.

"There was also a display of native handicraft, sponsored by the "Homemakers Guild." Some articles are plain knitting and needlework, while a great many articles are a work of art in afghans, braided rugs, etc.

Anchorage looks to be about the size of Charlottetown. It has a population of about 25,000. The people are less conservative and are of all types. They wear about anything in warm clothing. Many men wore beards. In fact they had a beard growing contest in Anchorage, so I was told and anyone caught clean shaven on "Alaska Day" was "turned in" of course, this did not apply to the military personnel who are stationed here."
