EXTRAORDINARY—IF TRUE.

It is rumored that owing to certain legislation of the Farquharson Government, the licensed liquor sellers in Charlottetown are legally entitled to keep their places of business open as follows, viz: From eight o'clock on Monday morning until Tuesday evening at seven o'clock; then close until eight o'clock Wednesday morning when they may open and sell without interruption until seven o'clock on Friday evening; at this hour they must again close until Saturday morning at eight o'clock; open then and remain open until six o'clock on that day, when they should close until Monday morning at eight o'clock.

If the rumor that is current on the streets be well founded, it shows an extraordinary concession on the part of the Farquharson Government to the liquor dealers, and an explanation must be demanded and given.

Under the Liquor Regulation Act of 1892, all places where liquor was sold were required to be closed at ten o'clock every night except Saturday, when they should shut at seven p. m. But it is now said, with what truth we have been unable to verify, that when the Farquharson Government adopted the License System the law was changed, as above described, enabling the liquor dealers to keep open all night on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

May the public, especially the temperance section, and the Alliance, ask for an explanation of this extraordinary legislation?

THE KINDERGARTEN.

EVIDENTLY RATTLED.

THE PATRIOT is apparently badly rattled over the alleged prohibitory law passed by the Pineau-Farquharson-Club Administration. In its issue of last evening, in the biggest and blackest type at its command, the statement is made that the Methodists in Conference at Moncton expressed themselves as "delighted with our Prohibitory law" when there is nothing whatever in the report over which the heading is placed to justify such an assertion. Again, as far back as June 9th the Patriot proclaimed, in equally large letters, that "Prohibition is now the law of this Province," when everyone knows that the measure—maimed as it is—does not go into force until June next!

METHODIST CONFERENCE.

At Monday's session of the conference at Moncton the report of the committee on Sabbath observance was submitted and adopted without discussion. It urges the better observance of the day suggests that each minister be requested to preach some time during the confessional year at least one sermon on the subject of Sabbath observance.

The secretary-treasurer of the St. James' Church relief fund reported that the conference had contributed \$1900 to the fund.

The report of the committee on the state of church work expressed pleasure with the response to the appeal for funds; also the spiritual progress shown in the Epworth League, in the flourishing Sunday schools and attendance on public worship; but regretted the small decrease in church membership. The committee disapproved the use of sensational methods to secure revivals. Some objection was taken to the latter statement, and also to an intimation in the report that there was some neglect in baptizing invalids and children. The report was referred back to committee for amendment.

The report of the Union Church relief fund showed \$103.39 as receipts, of which the Charlottetown district contributed \$16.77 and the Summerside district \$8.48.

The report of the temperance committee was again discussed, along the same lines as Saturday, as to whether it was best to accept provincial prohibition or continue to press for the larger measure for the whole Dominion.

Ex Mayor Dawson, of Charlottetown, said he was compelled to vote against the resolution congratulating P. E. Island upon the prohibitory measure passed by the government of that Island. It had some good features, but on the whole the law was not such as to meet the views of the prohibitionists.

Dr. Allison moved in amendment to the clause under discussion, that the conference will await with great interest the practical outcome of the prohibitory legislation recently adopted by the Legislature of P. E. Island, and expressed the hope that the legislation will be found to be effective and salutary in the scope of its operation. The amendment was almost carried unanimously.

The clause endorsing the action of the Dominion Temperance Alliance was struck out unanimously.

The effect of the action taken by the Conference with reference to the temperance question is to adhere to the resolution passed last year in favor of prohibition for the whole Dominion.

THE DAIRY.—The factory at Hazelbrook is running in full blast with Mr. Joseph Burgess as manager. About 2,4000 pounds of milk were received on Monday morning out of which 35 cheese were manufactured; and 600 pounds was also received which could not be handled and consequently was left over for the following day. A meeting of the shareholders and patrons will be held this week to consider the advisability of building an annex to the factory. The cold storage apartment, which is the largest and best of any cheese factory on the Island, is found to be of great value during the warm weather.

ATHLETIC MEET.—Several of the crack athletes from Montague Company were to be seen on the C. A. A. track last evening, and judging from their performance Montague is going to make a hot bid for the all-round trophy, and our Charlottetown boys will have to look to their laurels. FEAST OF SACRED HEART.

Impressive Celebration at Alberton—Bishop McDonald Present.

His Lordship Bishop McDonald, surrounded by a numerous clergy, celebrated the Feast of the Sacred Heart at Alberton on Friday in the midst of elaborate decorations, impressive ceremonies and general rejoicings. The church of the parish is dedicated to the Sacred Heart and it was most beautifully trapped out in streamers of ecclesiastical colors, greenings, lights and banners. The altar was one mass of palms and white and pink lilies and many-colored lights. The spacious grounds were gaily decorated with bunting and Chinese lanterns. The illumination on the vigil was pretty as a fairy scene. The services in the morning concluded with a solemn High Mass of which Rev. Dr. Monaghan was celebrant and Rev. Fathers Chaisson and Gallant the deacons, the Rev. Dr. Murphy was Master of Ceremonies, His Lordship in cape and mitre assisted at the throne. There was a general reception of the sacraments of Penance and Eucharist, the devotion of the people calling forth the highest praise of the Bishop, who, introduced by the pastor just before solemn High Mass, preached an eloquent discourse on the Sacred Heart. There was Benediction immediately after mass and a procession when the voices were chanted. The Acts of Consolation were read by the Rev. Father Burke. His Lordship the Bishop gave the Benediction and a most imposing religious service was then terminated.
