FUNERAL AT MILLTOWN CROSS — The funeral of the late Mr. Lauchlin Bruce, who passed away October 20th, was held from his home at Milltown Cross on Monday afternoon, October 22nd. It was largely attended. The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Hales. Mr. Hales used as his text Matthew the 23rd chapter, "Good and Faithful Servant". Favorite hymns sung were "The Lord's My Shepherd", "Shall We Gather At the River", "The Interment took place in the Valleyfield Cemetery. Pall-bearers were six elders. Messrs. George MacLean, Malcolm Stewart, John M. MacPherson, William Whitman, Murdoch McGowan and John S. MacPhee. The late Mr. Bruce is the son of the late John Bruce and Christie MacQueen and is survived by one daughter, Christine, of Dayton, Ohio, and one son, Duncan, who is on the homestead. A brother, John, in Brooklyn, P. E. I., also survives.

Annandale Harbor Is Nearing Completion

Fishermen of Annandale and surrounding area will welcome the completion of the fine boat harbor there which is at present in its final stages. Located on the sheltered side of a land arm, and also protected by an extended bar, the harbour will afford adequate protection for boats during the fishing season, and a base for operations to the fishing grounds. Construction of the harbour was begun in 1948, when the first piles were driven. In a short time the crib work around three sides, twenty feet in width, was laid, to be followed by the placing of frontal wallings and 4-inch sheathing. The harbour is 120 feet wide, and 120 to 150 feet long in pentagonal form with a thirty foot opening to the sea. The average water depth is 10 feet, with 7 feet at low water, and 13 feet at high, sufficient to provide accommodations for 75 to 80 boats. About 45 boats use this base during the two-month lobster season. Dredge No. 14 has been on the spot for the past two weeks dredging out the harbour, and putting the mud above and behind the crib work to be levelled later by the bulldozer. Mr. Edward Robertson, foreman, stated that the whole project would be completed in a very short time, and that it would provide for the fishermen of the area a shelter which had been greatly needed in the past.

Motor Vessel Loads Pulp Wood At Georgetown

On Monday, Oct. 22nd, the M.V. Lady Cecil arrived in port at Georgetown from Quebec and immediately started taking on a cargo of 230 cords of pulpwood. Loading operations continued throughout Monday and Tuesday, with a number of trucks hauling the pulp from the storage yard at the entrance to the town. Loading was completed on Tuesday evening and the ship sailed for Chandler, Province of Quebec. The Lady Cecil has made several trips from this port to Chandler during the past summer, with cargoes of pulpwood. Mr. A. Peters of Souris and his associates are the shippers. Harbour Pilot Temple Gotell, assisted by co-pilot Victor Rafuse, took the ships in and out of port. The steady cutting of pulp continues in the Georgetown area and a large number of local men are engaged in the industry, with some having purchased tracts of woodland and others working on shares or day's pay. It is also reliably reported that a resumption of pit prop cutting will be commenced in the near future, with a prominent exporting firm reported as about ready to assemble a cargo in Georgetown.
