To protect the public from the indiscriminate use and sale of sub-standard electrical appliances, devices and materials.

Ltd., Moncton and a member of the Illuminating Engineering Society gave a very interesting talk on the modern trends of lighting, such as used in houses, offices, assembly halls and work shops, and pointed out that the Public Demand for adequate lighting has increased at least four-fold in the past few years.

S'side Man Vice-President Of NB, PEI Merchants Ass'n

A Summerside merchant, Mr. Frank Jenkins, was elected first vice-president of the newly organized New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island division of the Retail Merchants Association of Canada Incorporated, at a meeting in Moncton last weekend.

Mr. Burns Branch, vice president of W.J. Kent and Co., Bathurst, N.B. was elected president for both provinces; Mr. Leon Chiasso, Edmundston, N. B., second vice-president, and Mr. Ted Goldman, Campbellton, N.B. was elected treasurer.

A board of directors advisory committee comprising three from each province, was elected. Those named for P.E.I. were Mr. J. R. MacLean, Souris; Mr. P. M. MacCaull, Ellerslie; and Mr. Fulton Pierce, Charlottetown.

Those from N.B. were Mr. T.J. Leger, Moncton; Mr. D.A. Creaghan, Newcastle; and Mr. F. E. De Venne, Lancaster.

Mr. Robert Willet, of Summerside, was elected to a committee chosen to deal with by-laws of the association.

The enthusiasm of the directors at this meeting was shown by some of the resolutions passed which offered their full support to the potato and apple growers of the provinces in marketing these products at a fair and reasonable price to all. Behind these resolutions was the thought that producers as well as labor and industry must flourish to provide for a healthy economy.

At the same time the new board of directors asked for the support of their national office in enlisting the co-operation of other provinces to work together in disposing of their own and each other's surplus.

It was felt that this, in co-operation with the Department of Agriculture and the Potato and Apple Marketing Board of N.B. and P.E.I., in instigating without delay, a sales and promotion program with retailer participation for the development of greater potato and apple sales at home and in the neighboring provinces, would greatly relieve the depressed state of these industries in our provinces.

They also strongly objected to the use of false claims and misrepresentation in press and radio advertising by some retailers with the request that the Department of Justice take definite steps to stop this practice which undermines consumer confidence.

They decided that their provincial office should be located in the Summerside area.
