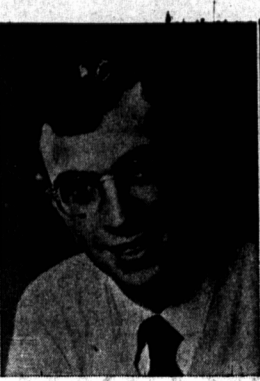

Going To Japan

Richard Wedge, son of Mayor Henry W. and Mrs. Wedge of Summerside, has been chosen to attend an international seminar in Japan being sponsored jointly by the Japanese and Canadian Committees of World University Service. The theme of the seminar will be "The responsibility of higher education." The 20 Canadian, 7 American students and staff members will travel to Tokyo, via Vancouver, arriving in Japan on July 1. The program will commence with a four-day orientation session at Koyasan, a Buddhist monastery, and will be followed by a two weeks study tour of Japan. The students will then take part in a one-week work camp before the seminar, which will be held during the month of August at the International Christian University near Tokyo. After the seminar visits will be made to Japanese universities and other places of interest. The program will attempt to provide an introduction to the life of the Japanese people, including their family life, culture, religions, politics and educational systems. The students will return in September for the opening of their respective universities. The 4, 5 which make these seminars possible are provided by grants from universities, provincial governments and Asian foundations. Richard, on his return from Japan, will enter senior year at St. Dunstan's University next fall. He has been chairman of World University Service and the National Federation of Canadian University Students Committees at that university for the past year, and is the president-elect of St. Dunstan's Student Union.

S'ide Council Discusses Plans For Buildings

Mr. Webber will return to Summerside in about 10 days at which time it is expected that definite building plans will be accepted and action preliminary to their construction will be commenced.
