Thank You Forward Aid Plan For Millions

UNITED NATIONS (CP) — Acting Secretary-General U Thant has a bid forward a broad 10-year United Nations program for increasing the living standards of a billion people who are hungry, ill-clad and unable to read or write. Thant said he is responsible for a "UN development decade," the multi-billion dollar program is set out in a proposal made public by President Kennedy when he addressed the General Assembly last Nov. 25. He urged that the current decade be declared a "UN development decade."

The assembly approved the resolution unanimously.

There has been no announcement by the United States—the principal supporter of UN aid programs in the past—as to how much money it will contribute. The Soviet Union has not made any specific commitment.

The main objective is to create conditions under which the national incomes of the developing, or "have-not" countries, would increase at a rate of five per cent annually by 1970 and continue to increase at that rate thereafter. The present rate of increase is estimated at 3½ per cent.

Canadian Sees Urgent Need For Britain Joining ECM

 LONDON (CP) — A Canadian business leader struck a responsive chord here when he stressed the need for Britain to join the European Economic Community.

Eric W. Kierans, president of the Canadian and Montreal stock exchanges, said Britain must join because "the Common Market cannot be permitted to fall out of line with an inward-looking bloc."

Kierans, formerly economics professor at McGill university in Montreal, said the community has been the "outstanding example of success in industrial competition, co-operation between states and individual enterprise."

3 Convicts Believed Drowned

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A floating plastic bag full of names and addresses has convinced the director of the Federal Bureau of Prisons that three missing Alcatraz convicts died in their carefully-planned try for freedom.

But the FBI isn't stopping its search for the trio of bank robbers until it finds a body.

The San Francisco Chronicle reported Sunday that the coast guard found the bag bobbing in San Francisco Bay near the island prison.

It contained the list of persons the missing men evidently intended to get in touch with, said prison director James Bennett in Washington, in confirming the find.

The theory is that they would have abandoned their names, which they obviously carried for contacts, unless they were drowning," he said.

The three—Frank L. Norris, John Anglin and his brother Clarence—were last seen Monday night, shortly before they fled to the beach of Alcatraz through vent pipes, across a roof and over a fence.
