

Drag Racing In Britain Beginning To Take Root

LONDON (CP)—Drag racing, a North American export that made its first appearance in Britain two years ago, appears destined to fill the gap between motorcycle and traditional racing cars.

The British Drag Racing Association, formed eight months ago, already has 700 members and expects to hit 1,000 by the end of the year.

Its first major undertaking was to sponsor the first British

International Drag Festival at Chelveston in Northamptonshire last fall. With several entries from the United States, it was a roaring success. Total attendance topped 120,000. The association is planning a second festival this September and hopes to make it an annual affair.

Drag races, in which two hot rods show off their powers of acceleration over a quarter-mile strip, were introduced to Britain in July, 1963.

Sydney Allard, owner of one of the few dragsters in the country at the time, was challenged by Danie Duce, a Las Vegas speedster who wanted to arrange a match between Allard and Dean (Mooneyes) Moon of Los Angeles, driving a souped-up Chevrolet.

A considerable amount of ground work and research has already been done by golfers from this area.

Among those who have been working on the feasibility of a golf course here were Kenneth R. MacDonald, George Nicholson, Duke MacDonald, Dave Clarkson and several others.

It is the hope of the organization that those interested in golf will be given the opportunity to learn the fundamentals of the game this year and although this will be a rough course, plans are being formulated to improve the course in future.

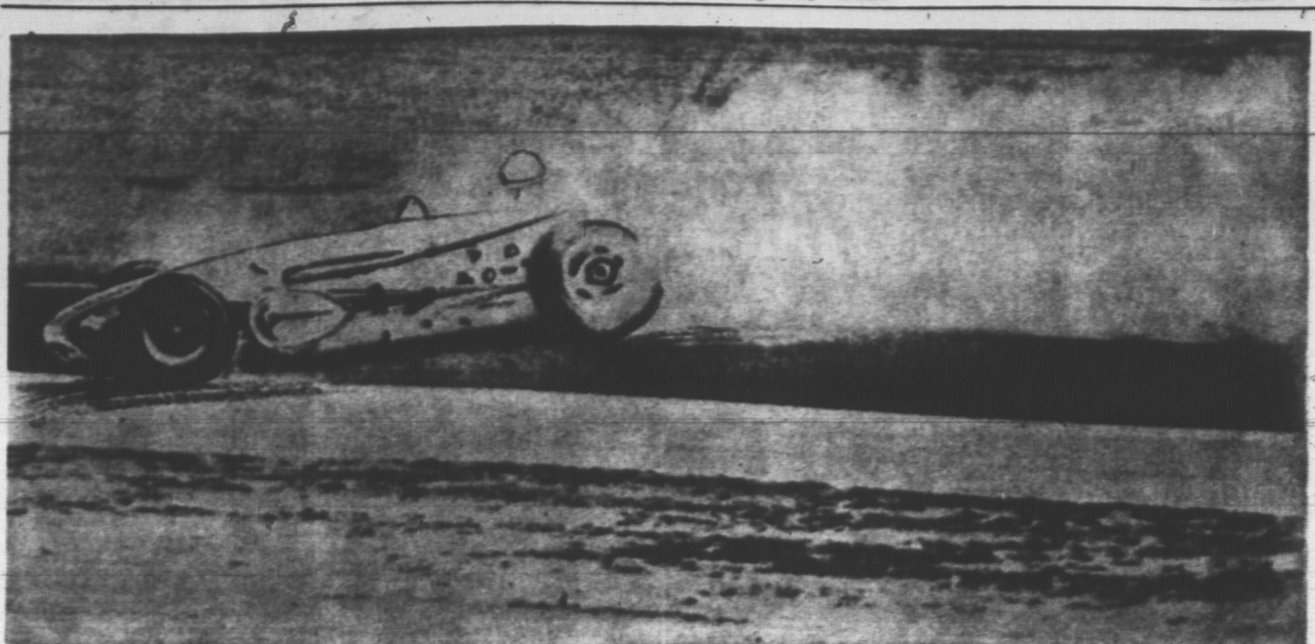

TV Coverage Of Football To Be Greatly Extended

MONTREAL (CP)—Radio contact with the referee on the field is one of the new techniques to be introduced this season in the telecasting of Canadian Football League games.

Jean-Paul Champagne described some of the innovations in an interview Friday. He is a member of the Montreal publicity firm (Bouchard, Champagne and Pelletier Ltd.), which last year purchased television rights for CFL season games in 1965 and 1966. The contract includes rights to the Grey Cup contests those years.

In describing the innovations, Champagne said the referee-in-chief will be equipped with a portable microphone and transmitter and will communicate with the play-by-play commentator. He will pass along pertinent information regarding penalties, stoppage of play and rule interpretation.

"In order to add color to game telecasts this season, we will add a bench commentator and the referee will be in communication with the broadcast booth," Champagne said.

level commentator and color man for its telecast games.

Champagne said arrangements had been made with the teams in both Eastern and Western conferences to have the yardsticks always located on the side opposite the cameras for easy home identification of downs and yardage.

Final approval for the innovations was received from the CFL rules committee last February.

"We have received tremendous co-operation from G. Sydney Halter (Canadian football Commissioner) and the executives of the EFC and WFC," Champagne said. "The league people realize the size of this telecast business."

Extent of football telecasts is seen in the results of a survey conducted by Champagne's

firm in Ontario and Quebec. The survey cost \$10,000 and 1,500 viewers were polled.

For Champagne's company it is a business of close to \$3,500,000 a year.

PREFER SATURDAYS
With this amount of money involved and prime viewing time at stake, the survey disclosed that 68.8 per cent prefer video games on Saturday, with Sunday running a close second. The third most popular game-time is Wednesday evening.

PROVIDE COLOR
The bench-level commentator will provide field-level color to home viewers and in addition will be telephone-equipped to talk to the play-by-play broadcaster. He will be in a position to assess injuries and player changes from his field vantage spot.

SPORTS FRONT PEI Baseball Ass'n Formed

A baseball meeting at the Islander Motor Lodge Thursday night resulted in the formation of the Prince Edward Island Amateur Baseball Association.

The reason for the meeting was to consider the possibilities of obtaining national affiliation for P.E.I. baseball leagues. To date, the AAU of C had taken care of the Island's baseball activities and has done a most commendable job, but several Island baseball officials felt national affiliation was necessary if baseball on the Island is to prosper.

Those in attendance at Thursday's meeting included: John Kane; Jim Fox; Charles Ryan, Dave Boswell, Don LeClair and Earl Nicholson, all from Charlottetown; Jim Hogan, Hank Landry, Henry Gallant, from Summerside, and Rev. Don MacLellan, Mt. Stewart.

When those present agreed that a national affiliation was necessary they decided to form the Prince Edward Island Amateur Baseball Association and election of officers ensued. The following are the elected officers: John Kane, president; Jim Hogan, 1st vice-president; Rev. Don MacLellan, 2nd vice-president; Charles Ryan, treasurer; Dave Boswell, permanent secretary; George Francis, honorary president; Directors: Art Sullivan, Kings County; Jim Fox, Queens County and Gerald Keogh, Tignish.

First Project

The first project this newly formed organization will undertake will be to conduct a provincial baseball clinic. They will work in conjunction with the provincial department of physical education on this project and an official for the organization has announced that four coaches from the National Baseball Federation will be brought in for this clinic.

One of the coaches is reported to be Doug Harvey of National Hockey League fame with the Montreal Canadiens.

Another direct result of the Island obtaining national affiliation will be that this summer there will be a junior team picked from the cream of the Island's junior crop to represent the province in a national junior tournament to be staged in Winnipeg, in late July.

This will mark the first season that all member provinces of the National Federation of Amateur Baseball have competed in this tournament.

Charles Ryan is at present the Island's delegate to the National Federation as a result of his appointment at the National meeting in Montreal in April. In the future this position will be filled annually, with an elected delegate from the P.E.I. Amateur Baseball Association.

This writer feels the forming of this association is definitely a step in the right direction.

Baseball has been for a long time the only sport in the Maritime provinces that didn't have a National governing body.

The Prince Edward Island five-pin bowling championship gets underway at Charlottetown's Rollaway bowling lanes today. There will be seven and possibly eight teams entered in the tournament. Philadelphia Eagles sued the city of Philadelphia Friday over exclusive professional football rights in a proposed new stadium. The action scuttled the \$25,000,000 project. The Eagles asked common pleas court either to force the city and Mayor James Tate to honor an alleged 1963 agreement giving the National Football League team exclusive rights in the stadium, or rule against all action on the project and declare as invalid the public vote approving financing.

Montreal Alouettes have asked G. Sydney Halter, commissioner of the Canadian Football League, to intervene on their behalf with the National Football League to determine the status of John Paglio, a rookie tackle and end from Syracuse. Paglio, 23, signed a contract earlier this year with NFL's Baltimore Colts. Alouettes claim the signing was illegal because Paglio signed with Montreal two months before accepting the Baltimore offer. Alouettes claim him by right of prior signing.
