Attention: Detailed instructions in connection with assembling and starting of Carnival Parade. Starting Point—The Forum. Commencement of Parade—8:00 p.m. All those taking part in the Parade please be on hand at no later than 6:30 p.m. inside the Forum. This is due to the tremendous number of participants who must be assembled at their numerical sections. Make-up All groups and individual characters requiring make-up will assemble in the make-up room in the Forum. Make-up and artists will be supplied for this purpose. Vehicles and Floats All vehicles and floats will assemble at the side door of the Forum on Cumberland Street. Directions Where and How to Assemble In accordance with the following program each group has been confined to a numerical section. On both sides of the Forum numerical signs will be placed from 1 to 23. Each group will line up in front of their allotted numerical section. Order of Parade Section 1—4 Dragons from Light-horse. After the Judges' decision is announced they will be formally presented by Kinman George Ayers in charge of the Princesses' arrangements. The chairman of the Judges will then present the Queen of the Confederation Carnival with a special floral bouquet, and the Princesses with individual bouquets. There are no special arrangements after the judging until the evening. CORONATION The Queen and her Princesses will assemble at the Forum early in the evening when they will be given their special ornamental articles of dress and will take up their respective positions on the Cradle of Confederation float. Special wardrobe attendants will assist the Queen and her Princesses. The Queen will be gowned in an ermine and sequin-trimmed red velvet court robe and the Princesses in ermine capes of court with diamond tiara headresses. Each Princess will wear a royal blue ribbon of honor on which the name of her home town will be embossed in silver. Two of the Princesses shall be appointed Ladies-in-Waiting on the Queen and these will be gowned in regal capes by the attendants. Two beautiful, petite page girls in attendance on the Queen will stand on either side of her throne. Two similar pages will be stationed at the rear of the float. The Queen and her pages will shower on the public a shower of confetti and these will be gowned in regal capes by the attendants. The termination of the parade will be at Queen Square. Upon arrival the Queen and her Princesses will be escorted from the Cradle of Confederation float to the coronation platform. The procession from there to the throne will pass between two lines of Militia who will present arms as the Queen and her retinue pass through. The Queen will proceed. Her royal throne train will be carried by two of her pages. Immediately behind her will follow her two Ladies-in-Waiting each with two pages carrying their regal capes. The crown and sceptre, each on a pillow of royal color, will be borne by two following pages. The retinue of the Queen will be accompanied by the six members of the Carnival Committee costumed in white naval officers uniforms will terminate the procession to the throne. 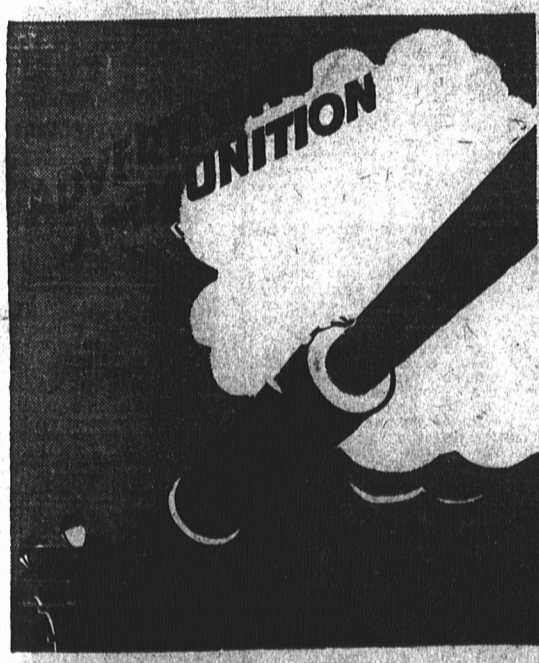
