IN MEMORIAM
PATRICK BRENNAN
 Relatives and friends were shocked and saddened when they heard of the sudden death on May 18th of one of Kinkora's oldest and highly respected citizens, Patrick Brennan.
 Born on the old family homestead 78 years ago, following the death of his father when only a boy he operated one of the Island's finest farms. Possessed of a kind and quiet disposition and beloved by all who knew him, he was a keen sportsman and took an active part in horse racing. He owned and trained many fine trotters. At the time of his death he owned the fine pacer "Abdem T. Clegg". The late Mr. Brennan had been in good health until the past winter at which time his doctor advised him to take several months' rest. Up until the last he was quite active and only the day previous to his death he was about his home supervising his farm help. The following day he was overcome by a heart seizure and passed away peacefully in his home with Rev. Father Roche and Dr. L. K. Ziellinski by his bedside.
 He will be greatly missed not only by his friends and relatives on the Island but by many people from U.S.A. and parts of Canada who visited his home during the summer. He leaves one sister to cherish his memory, Miss Mary B. Brennan. Three other sisters predeceased him.
 His funeral, which was largely attended, was held to St. Maachy's Church, Kinkora. Requiem High Mass was sung by Rev. Fr. Murray who also conducted the services at the grave. Rev. Fr. Keefe was seated in the sanctuary.
 Pall bearers were Messrs. Arnold Johnston, Leonard Keefe, Eugene McIvor, Peter D. McIvor, James McGuigan, Aden McIvor.
 The many Mass cards and spiritual offerings testified to the esteem in which the deceased was held.

Local Jaycees At Convention
 Annual meeting of the Maritime Region (No. 12) Junior Chamber of Commerce of Canada was held in the Nova Scotian Hotel at Halifax, N.S., May 21, 22, 23, 1954. 151 delegates registered, over 120 wives of delegates also registered. Delegates came from three Maritime Provinces.
 The delegates were welcomed to Halifax by Mr. Richard A. Donahoe, Q.C., Mayor of Halifax. Mayor Donahoe was the guest speaker at Friday evening's dinner. In addressing the delegates Mayor Donahoe paid tribute to the organization for the active interest taken in civic affairs. Too few people are willing to contribute their time and efforts to civic government but are quick to voice their criticism, he noted.
 Saturday's deliberations were taken up with business sessions including reports from the regional officers.
 One of the highlights of these sessions was the appointment of Regional President J. S. Kelly of Moncton as a "Senator" in J.C.C. (Junior Chamber International). Seventy-one nations are represented in this international organization. It was in recognition of an outstanding job done by the Regional President.
 Considerable discussion was given to the national convention of the organization which will be held in Halifax in June 1955. This will be the first National Convention to be held in the Maritimes.
 The president's dinner and ball was held Saturday.
 An outstanding Jaycee in the person of John H. Morris of Charlottetown was elected Regional President. Mr. Morris helped to organize the Charlottetown Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1949 and was the Charter President of this chamber. He is a past Regional vice-president, and also held office in the National organization.
 Other Regional officers elected were: Frank Keiver of Moncton, Regional vice-president for New Brunswick (East); Paul Mahar, Lancaster, vice-president for N.B. (West); Lauchie MacDougall, Sydney, vice-president for Nova Scotia (East); Charles Clarke, Dartmouth, vice-president for N.S. (West 2); Ignatius MacDonald, Charlottetown, vice-president for P.E.I.; Tony LeBlanc, Halifax, secretary. The treasurer is to be appointed by the president.
 Delegates and their wives attended in a body church services on Sunday at St. Matthew's United Church, and St. Mary's Basilica.
 National President Harry Smith of Toronto was the guest speaker at Sunday's luncheon. The president brought greetings from Chambers from all parts of Canada and reported on the activities of the National body as well as the International organization.
 National vice-president Lyman Purnell of Lancaster, N. B., was in attendance throughout the convention.
 Business sessions, social events, shopping and sightseeing tours were organized for the delegates' wives.
 The convention was declared to be the most successful yet held.

Statistics on Illness In Canada
 OTTAWA, (CP)—Roughly three out of five Canadians are prevented by illness from following their normal activities at some time during the course of a year, according to the fifth of a series of reports based on the 1950-51 Canadian sickness survey.
 This survey was a joint undertaking of the bureau of statistics, and the federal and provincial health departments. Estimates are based on a sample of some 30,000 people.
 On the average, the illnesses lasted for 11.9 days per person.
