

## Forest Fires Cause Worry In N.B., Nfld.

FREDERICTON (CP) — A forest by a 15-mile northwest wind, a forest fire along the New Brunswick River 10 miles south of Miramichi was still considered out of control Monday night.

Forest Protection officials in Fredericton here reported the fire moving slowly southeast in a slash of a cut-over area. The fire was driven by westerly winds in danger. A spotting plane was up late Monday to bring firefighters up to date on the fire area.

**BIG LAZAR REPORTED**

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — A rain forecast for eastern Newfoundland failed to show up Monday, and a major forest fire about 20 miles south of the town continued to rage out of control in sunny weather.

Burning on a two-mile front, the fire was driven by westerly winds blowing almost steadily at 50 miles an hour. The area destroyed was in excess of 800 acres.

Helicopters spent most of the day ferrying forestry department firefighters and equipment into the fire, which in late afternoon broke out again at the southern end where it started late Sunday.

The fire was burning largely in spruce, although some fir was also in its path.

No communities were threatened, and summer homes and cottages which spot the area were not believed out of danger. The fire was burning roughly parallel to the community of Bay Bulls, about four miles away.

Another fire which may have started from the main fire, was spotted late Monday about four miles south of the main fire. Its extent was not immediately known.

PCs Set Records In P.E.I.

A still vigorous Progressive Conservative party in P.E.I. set several new all time records here yesterday as it swept to its third impressive clean sweep of all four seats in the five year period, something that no other party had ever been able to accomplish here.

The triumphant PCs also sent Fisheries Minister Angus MacLean back to Ottawa for the fifth straight time since 1951, something that no other Island candidate had ever been able to accomplish since Confederation.

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## Conservatives Gain Majority In House

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At that point, Social Credit had captured 24 of Quebec's 78 seats, knocking off eight Liberal-held ridings and 15 Conservative ones including the Bellechasse seat of State Secretary Dorion.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker won personal victory in Prince Albert, Sask., which the 46-year-old Conservative leader has represented since 1953. Most of his cabinet came back in Liberal Leader Pearson also won personal re-election in Alberta East.

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## PM Visits In Museum During Election Day

PRINCE ALBERT (CP) — While Canada voted Monday, Prime Minister Diefenbaker browsed down memory lane.

With the future of his Progressive Conservative government in the hands of the electorate, Mr. Diefenbaker dropped into the Prince Albert historical museum in the courthouse on Monday morning.

"It's a wonderful experience here today," he said, "standing on the 14th courthouse steps and looking down the street that spans the railway tracks and goes straight as an arrow into central avenue."

"It brings back so many early experiences," he said.

His day began in his special railway coach parked on the rail line just a block from Central Avenue. Up early the prime minister and Mrs. Diefenbaker were driven to the poll to cast their ballots.

Then back to his railway car, where he talked briefly to national Progressive Conservative director Allanist Grosart, who although in his 80th year, was still active in the party.

Mr. Grosart asked the prime minister the latest party prediction on Monday's voting, but it was kept a closely guarded secret.

## Social Credit Seen As Cinderella Party

John Diefenbaker's Progressive Conservatives emerged with the largest group of elected Commons members—a minority — from Monday's topsy-turvy general election.

The Canadian Press reported at 12:07 a.m. EDT that the Conservatives would have more MPs than any other party in the 365-seat House of Commons.

Social Credit—in the last election in 1958 unable to elect a single member—was the election's Cinderella party with 31 gains in Quebec, mainly at Conservative expense.

Liberals on the comeback also chopped at the former big Conservative majority of MPs in Ontario, Canada, especially in Ontario.

In the Atlantic provinces there were only minor Conservative losses.

**MANY PC LOSSES**

But in Ontario and Quebec there was a major turnover of Conservative seats.

There were a number of close neck-and-neck contests in individual ridings, raising the possibility of recounts.

Meanwhile, as the surprising pattern of election returns unfolded, another possibility emerged—that the Kestev's Ontario riding of Stormont, where voting has been deferred to July 16, could have a bearing on the eventual outcome. The Stormont vote was postponed by the death of the Liberal candidate, Mr. Kestev, over three hours after Ontario and Quebec polls closed.

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## Douglas Votes Early, Then Tours Regina City

REGINA (CP) — T. C. Douglas voted early Monday and then toured Regina City in what he called a "long day."

Throughout the day the New Democratic Party leader kept up a busy pace before going to his election night headquarters in the downtown Regina. Saskatchewan education minister O. Turnbull.

Mr. Douglas told reporters he expected it would be a fairly heavy poll and that it would probably be a close election result.

## Sinking Story Seen As Hoax Or Mistake

SITUATE, Mass. (AP) — A report that a submarine was sinking off the Massachusetts coast started an intensive sea-air search late Monday before it was disclosed as either a hoax or a series of mistakes.

The report originated in a garbled radio call on an emergency distress frequency, saying a vessel was burning some 20 miles at sea, the U.S. Coast Guard said.

Before a search could be launched the report had grown to the navy submarine USS Argonaut sinking. The coast guard could not explain the discrepancy.

One coast guard source said what someone thought was a sinking submarine "probably was a spoofing what was a radio call picked up by the coast guard came from the area of Farsham Boat buoy, some 40 miles south of Point, N.H., where the navy submarine Squawon sank in 1939 with the loss of 36 men.

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## Three RCMP, One Civilian Are Slain In B.C. Shooting

KAMLOOPS, B.C. (CP) — A rifle-wielding gunman was shot and killed by two policemen Monday less than three hours after he had slain three young RCMP constables in a wild shooting spree.

The gunman, a resident of a remote town of here where he had fled on foot after he killed the three policemen with a high-powered rifle, was shot in a wide-open area.

Employees in the nearby province were in the Kamloops and residents in the Kamloops home for the Agor saw the shooting.

"It looks as though he started shooting after the constables were within pistol range," said Supt. Harris. "He stood on a culvert above them and started firing immediately, killing the three men."

The gunman fled along the bed of Peterson Creek into the hills.

Two police officers on a 30-man party that sought him with aid of two helicopters, saw him come up over a hill.

"He started firing," Supt. Harris said, "and our men returned the fire, killing him."

The report identified him as Thomas Doty 51, of Kansas City, who has figured in an investigation since the Continental Airlines '67 mysteriously disappeared in stormy darkness over the Midwest — Iowa border area.

CHATHAM, Ont. (CP) — Harvey C. Lumley, at 101 Chatham's oldest voter, missed casting his ballot Monday for the first time since 1958.
