The hymns sung were, "Unto the Hills," and "The Lord's My Shepherd." The choir, under the direction of her nephew, Roland L. Jay, as organist, sang very beautifully, "Forever with the Lord." Guest Speaker At Home And School Meeting

"There is a great need for the provision of courses in our schools to prepare those children for community citizenship and worthwhile contributory effort to the community development who do not intend to continue their academic training by university attendance," stated Mr. K. A. Parker, director of City schools, in a challenging address delivered before the Montague Home and School Association last night.

Mr. Parker related the school and community, showing the interdependence of one on the other, both deriving their being from the unit, the home. He spoke glowingly of our Island heritage, and said our children must be convinced of this heritage through our schools, through parents and teachers cooperating together to develop the child to an appreciation of this heritage, and to contribute by his endeavours his portion to be passed on to posterity.

Talk Home Rule For Singapore

LONDON. (Reuters) — Singapore chief minister David Marshall announced Tuesday that his delegation has reached "complete cordiality and full understanding" in exploratory talks on home rule for Singapore.

He emerged from his second official talk with the colonial office and declared: "I am feeling very, very happy."

He meets with Colonial Secretary Alan Lennox-Boyd Thursday and Friday for final agreement on dates and agenda for a conference here next spring for all Singapore's political parties to discuss the colony's constitutional progress.

Marshall hopes to get self-government for Singapore by 1957.

At the conclusion of the meeting a vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Parker for his excellent address by Judge J. S. DesRoches, chairman, on behalf of the members of the Home and School.
