



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Old Home Week 1954 has passed into history but it will be remembered as bringing together the largest number of trotters and pacers that have ever faced a starter over a Maritime track, also as having paid out total cash purses of \$25,450, by far the biggest amount ever distributed at any harness race meet in these provinces by the sea. Unfortunately, practically all over the Dominion there has been weather disturbances and rain proved to be the only unfavorable factor in what would have been an enjoyable week. Notwithstanding the difficulties which the weatherman placed in their way the management by herculean efforts, carried the entire program to its conclusion and were rewarded by large attendances on all race days and by the fact that on Friday night after hours of work on the track because of a deluge of a half hour's duration, people sat until eleven o'clock when racing was started, and continued interested until the last event was concluded around two o'clock in the morning.

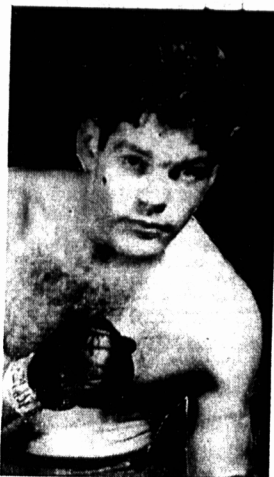
From Monday night until Saturday night 65 heats were paced and 15 trotted. The fastest mile trotted was by the 5-year-old

stallion Dean Gallon, owned and driven by Earle Semple, Kensington, P.E.I., in the Free-For-All Trot, Saturday afternoon — time, 2:09 4/5. This is a new record for Dean. He took a record of 2:11 as a 3-year-old racing in Maine, did not race last year and Earle recently purchased the interests of his partners and is now the sole owner. His new record made over a heavy track, stamps him as a horse that should trot under favorable conditions in 2:06 or better.

The fastest mile paced was by Bay State Pat, owned by Andrew Perry, Summerside, and driven by James MacGregor, on Saturday night — time, 2:10 — a new record for Bay State Pat, that started the season without a record. He was bred by Chris O'Donnell, one of the most prominent horsemen of Massachusetts and was tried and found wanting and offered at a very low price to an Island horseman. Later on he was sold to a party in New Brunswick who had no success with him and he sold him to Andrew Perry for \$300. A couple of months ago Chester Smith and later Art Burbine, started training him and changed him from

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Middleweight champion Carl (Bobo) Olson retained his title Friday night, winning a 15-round decision over Rocky Castellani in a bout during which both fighters hit the canvas.

The decision by referee Ray Flores and the two judges was unanimous.

A crowd estimated at more than 12,000 saw the nationally televised scrap in the huge Cow Palace.

Castellani astonished the crowd when he sent the champion down for a three-count in the 11th round. Bobo was not hurt.

The champion sent the 28-year-old challenger to the canvas for a nine count with a terrific right to the jaw as the 12th opened.

Both fighters weighed 160.

The wholesale loss of trout that occurred on the headwaters of the Wilmot River during the first week in August, due to careless handling of potato spraying material, may now be considered a closed chapter so far as the enforcement angle is concerned.
