Tignish Catholic Church Receives Memorial Gift

In memory of his parents and members of his family who departed from this life in recent years Mr. William D. Sumner has had a complete loud speaker system together with a new modern lectern pulpit installed in the St. Simon and St. Jude Catholic Church at Tignish. The loud speaker itself has been a long felt need by the parishioners of this historic ninety-seven year old church which is one of the oldest and largest in this province.

Built in 1860 this edifice constructed of brick is completely finished inside and out in Gothic design. It has been kept in constant repair which accounts for its well preserved condition at the present time. Recently the pastor Rev. M.J. Rooney had a new tile floor put in the main body and Sanctuary, and four years ago under the former pastor, the

late John A. McDonald, the interior was entirely painted and redecorated. The forthcoming centennial celebration to mark the 100 years anniversary of this ancient church will be held in 1960 and already plans are under way to make the occasion a festive one.

Mr. Sumner is one of the many successful islanders in the United States where he has been practising law for many years. He was born at Tignish in 1876 and spent his boyhood there. However for the last twenty years he has returned to the island each year to spend the summer months at St. Roch, a suburb of Tignish, and has taken an active part in the promotion of baseball and other sports in many school districts in West Prince. Outside of his stay here in the summer he devotes the rest of his time to his profession in the State of Texas with headquarters at San Antonio.

Supplies Civil Servants With Inexpensive Recreation

OTTAWA (CP) — A four-man staff operating from a one-time boarding house in central Ottawa runs what may be the biggest recreation association of its kind in North America.

English-born Arthur Sykes, manager, and Al Herra, sports director from Montreal, are helped by two office workers and many volunteers in operating the "RA," the civil service recreation association.

The association has as members 11,000 of the capital's 30,000 federal workers.

SEEK MORE MEMBERS
"And we're trying for another 5,000 this year," said Len Hill, president of the association and one of the hundreds of volunteers who do 95 per cent of the work of the association.

Mr. Hill, 53-year-old Ottawa-born chief of personnel of the House of Commons staff, has served 14 years on the elected 2-man board of directors of the association. He is in his second year as president.

He and Jack Vinokuer, 42-year-old member of the civil service commission staff, talked of the 16-year history of the association during an interview.

Mr. Vinokuer, a native of Montreal, is voluntary editor of the monthly RA News, official publication of the association.

"The RA was formed in 1941 when the city was being flooded

with thousands of civil servants here for the war and there was a crying need for recreation—and inexpensive recreation," said Mr. Vinokuer.

NOMINAL FEE
"The fees were 22 cents a year then and still are," said Mr. Hill. However, extra charges are made for special activities.

Mr. Sykes, retired from the revenue department, handles the business end of the RA from the old three-storey house on Lisgar Street which will soon be replaced by a modern \$1,000,000 building on a 32-acre site in the city's southern outskirts.

The RA already has \$710,000 on hand for the new headquarters, which will bring under one roof most of its 40 activities, ranging from the biggest bridge and chess clubs in Canada to curling, softball, basketball, and stamp collecting. Construction is expected to start this fall.

Activities like the yacht club, flying club and skiing club will continue to operate where facilities are at hand—Dow's Lake on the Rideau Canal, Uplands Airport, and the Gatineau Hills in neighboring Quebec.

Other activities include low-cost guided excursions to the Caribbean and Europe every year, a camera club, opera club and art club. Beauty contests is held every year to choose Miss Civil Service. Basic fee is 23 cents a year, but expensive activities like yachting and flying involve an extra expense of about \$10 a year, rarely more. The four-week excursions to Europe, which include visits to six or seven countries, cost about \$600, and include transportation, meals and accommodation. The 17-day Caribbean cruise costs \$225.

Canadian Guards Buy Present For The Queen

CAMP GAGETOWN, NB (CP) — The Regiment of Canadian Guards has raised \$2,000 to buy a diamond regimental crest for presentation to the Queen during her October visit to Canada. The Queen is colonel-in-chief of the regiment.

The money was raised by assessing each officer \$4, senior non-commissioned officer \$2 and guardsman \$1.

The regiment is also expected to provide a 100-man guard of honor for the Queen in Ottawa, it was learned Sunday.

The guards have reportedly invited the Queen to visit their station at Camp Petawawa, Ont., for the presentation of the crest.

All these plans have irked some members of the other regiments in the Canadian Infantry Corps. The Regiment of Canadian Guards, though formed only in 1953, takes precedence over the other five regiments—Royal 22nd Regiment, Royal Canadian Regiment, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, Queen's Own Rifles and the Black Watch.

The other regiments are especially irked by the reported guards invitation to the Queen to visit Camp Petawawa, where the Queen might present regimental colors to the unit they feel that Her Majesty should not have asked to visit a single army unit though they concede she is the guard's colonel-in-chief.

However, it is understood that the Queen will confine her Canadian visit to Ottawa and some arrangement for presentation of the crest there will be made.

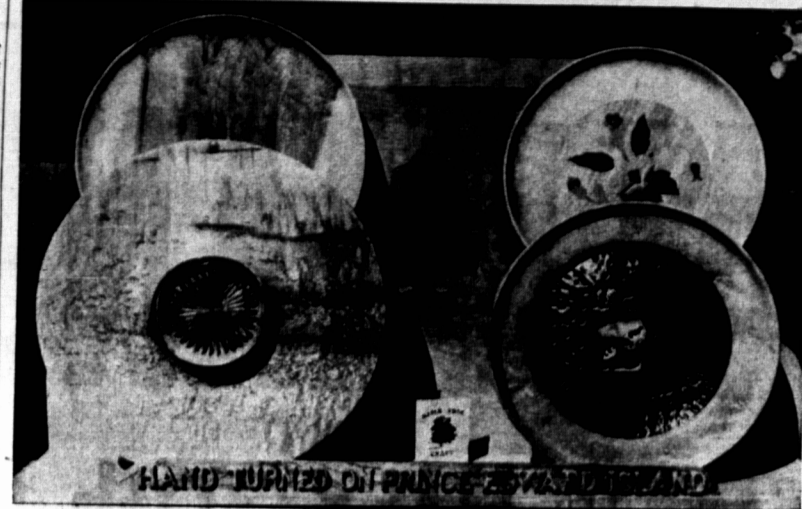

WOOD CARVING HOBBY GROWS



Within the past few years Alberton has become the home of one of Prince Edward Island's finest and best known handicrafts. From its modest beginning in the small workshop of Herbert Leavitt Maple Tree Craft has become Canada and in other countries to which samples of the art have been sent as gifts.

After five years of service with the R.C.A.F. during World War II, F.L. Leavitt received his discharge in 1946 and continued to build plywood boats. Becoming fascinated with wood, he gradually began wood turning.

The hobby expanded and today he is turning out trays, plates and bowls of various sizes and designs. All are made from choice island woods which are carefully selected for their clearness and beauty of grain. Woods used are bird's eye, white and sugar maple, white and yellow birch, beech and red oak. One type of tray is made with wooden inlay of several designs. These inlays, the only part of Maple Tree Craft to be imported, are made from various woods.
