## Local and Other Items

—There was a small attendance at the market to-day.

—There is plenty of lolly in Charlottetown harbor today.

—The schr. Halcyon, owned by McDonald & Westaway, Georgetown, is reported ashore at Souris.

—The City of Ghent, is expected in Charlottetown about midnight. She was at Port Hawkesbury this morning.

—Colonel Otter and the remainder of his men of the Royal Canadian Regiment, sailed from Liverpool today in the Steamship Lake Champlain.

—The steamer Princess left Charlottetown for Pictou at seven o'clock this morning, and is expected back with the mails early to-morrow morning.

—Messrs. Dillon & Spillett yesterday purchased 1800 cheese, the remainder of the output of the Kensington and Park Corner factories. These cheese will be shipped to the Old Country this week, probably on Friday. This will, it is understood, close the export trade this season.

—The Northumberland crossed to Point du Chene yesterday afternoon and remained there over night. This morning she left on return to Summerside but was unable to enter the harbor on account of ice, and proceeded to Charlottetown, where she is expected this afternoon.

—The funeral of the late Mr. John King was held this forenoon, leaving the house on Euston Street at 8.45. There was a large attendance considering the cold morning. The mass of requiem at St. Dunstan's Cathedral was offered up by Rev. Dr. Monaghan, who also conducted the services at the grave. The pall-bearers were John Nicholson, R. B. Norton, Maurice Doyle, Henry Fitzgerald, A. A. McDonald and T. White.

—At the meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade on Monday the matter of direct steamship accommodation was discussed. Sir Louis Davies, who was present, was asked to use his influence to have the first direct steamer to the Old Country in the spring call at Charlottetown as early as possible, not later than May 20th, and to make the remaining trips about the following dates: Sep. 15th, between Oct. 25th and Nov. 1st, and from Dec. 5th to 10th. A 3,000 ton steamer would meet the requirements and it must be fitted with cold storage. The rate of freight will have to be the same as from Montreal. Sir Louis promised to use his best efforts to have the desired arrangements made.

—This morning Messrs Prowse and McMillan informed us that they have succeeded in securing Prof. Vinnicombe's orchestra to play in the rink this winter. We understand that the price paid is a little more than usual; but using the managers' words "nothing is too good for our skates." We think this music will be a decided improvement on the band inasmuch as it will be very much softer and sweeter, a much to be desired effect for inside work. The orchestra will have about twelve pieces; and we heartily endorse the managers in their tireless efforts to give the best service possible this winter. Although the price of light, coal, music and rent is higher than last year, we are surprised to find that tickets will be sold at the old prices. This we believe deserves our most hearty support and it is hoped that the skating public will appreciate the boys. Prof. Vinnicombe assures us that he will give a new programme of music nearly every night throughout the season. This will be a change which will be appreciated. If the weather holds cold the rink will be open next week.

Hot wave coming, will strike Charlottetown on the 13th. On that date, in the Y M C A Hall, the ladies of Lady Roberts' Lodge are going to offer the Citizens of Ch-town an up-to-date entertainment and pie social. The boys in Khaki will be there. Private Walker will tell you how our brave boys assisted in avenging Majuba Hill. This part of the program, to all Canadians is worth many times over the small admission fee asked, which is only ten cents. Don't miss it.
